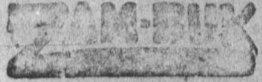

FURNESS LINER RAPPAHANNOCK WAS TORPEDOED BY HUNS

The Furness liner Rappahanock, Capt. Garrett, long overdue at London from Halifax was torpedoed sometime early in November...

The Rappahanock sailed from Halifax on October 17th with a general cargo, including some twenty thousand barrels of Nova Scotia apples...

The Rappahanock was placed on the Furness service to and from Halifax in 1907, and has been on this route ever since. She was a steamer of 2,511 tons net...

DEATH OF MR. HOWARD BLIGH

Mr. Howard Bligh, shipping master and prominent commission merchant at Halifax and leading farmer of Kings Co., died at the Halifax Infirmary early on Sunday morning...

The late Howard Bligh was born at Woodville, Kings County, October 7, 1845. His father Jeremiah Bligh, a prominent farmer and Justice of the Peace, of Kings County, and a descendant of one of the oldest settlers in the Cornwallis Valley.

Jeremiah Bligh, father of the late Howard Bligh, had four brothers, Geddes, whose son was W. E. Bligh, of the well-known firm of Bligh and Prince, Truro; James, whose only son is Dr. H. H. Bligh, K. C., librarian of the Supreme Court, Ottawa; Abraham, whose eldest son, S. W. Bligh, is a stipendiary magistrate at Berwick; A. B., who contested Kings Co. for the House of Assembly in 1859 in support of the Tupper Administration...

The late Mr. Howard Bligh was associated in business with A. B. Bligh under the firm name of A. B. Bligh & Co., they carried on a large grocery business on Buckingham Street, on the premises now occupied by W. S. & H. H. Rogers. A. B. Bligh had but one son, Mr. F. P. Bligh, ex-Mayor of the City of Halifax.

Pioneer in Apple Trade

The late Mr. Howard Bligh took a great interest in farming and had large farms in Kings County. He gradually extended the firm's business and took his sons into partnership with him under the firm name of Howard Bligh & Sons. The deceased was one of the first to see the need for apple warehouses and with his associates built the first apple warehouse in the Province, at Cambridge on the line of the old Windsor and Annapolis Railway. He, too, was practically the pioneer in the establishment of the apple trade with South Africa.

The brother of the deceased, A. B. Bligh, was appointed shipping master of the port of Halifax, by the Macdonald-Tupper Administration in 1878, and the late Mr. Howard Bligh succeeded him to that post in 1888.

The late Howard Bligh is survived by three brothers, Everett and Emmerson, of Manitoba and Rupert, of Lakeville, Kings County; five sisters, Mrs. C. R. Bill, wife of Mr. C. R. Bill, collector of customs, Wolfville; Mrs. Gibson and Mrs. Goodenow, of Detroit; Mrs. Braithwaite, whose only son was recently in Halifax on his way overseas; Mrs. Elkins of Los Angeles.

The deceased is survived by four children by his first wife, who was the daughter of the late Major Thompson, of the 47th Regiment, a Crimean and Indian Mutiny veteran. DEUTSCHLAND IN COLLISION

New London, Conn., November 17—Five members of the crew of the tug T. A. Scott Jr., one of the tugs which accompanied the German submarine Deutschland from New London early today, on her return trip to Bremen, were drowned when the submersible and the tug collided in the Race, about twelve miles from this port. The only person on the tug saved was Captain Fred Hinsch, of the German interned liner Nectar. The tug, which belonged to the T. A. Scott Wrecking company, went to the bottom.

The Deutschland returned to her dock here at 5.15 a. m. Officials declined to discuss the accident or to tell the extent of the damage inflicted on the submarine. The tug and the submarine came together, in a comparatively smooth sea.

RECRUITING OFFICERS

Major W. B. A. Ritchie, the Chief Recruiting Officer at Halifax, requests the publication of the following:

Reports are frequently circulated as to persons engaged in recruiting being paid for their services which are very unfair to those who voluntarily, and as a purely patriotic service a large amount of time to recruiting work. The members of the Citizens Recruiting Committees of course receive no pay, and since last March the County Recruiting Officers throughout the Province have served without pay. Outside of the staff at Halifax, there are only three paid recruiting officers or deputy recruiting officers in the Province and no officer, non-commissioned officer or private is paid for recruiting work except those who devote their whole time to the work. We have been authorized by the Chief Recruiting Officer to make the above statement in statements which have been circulated to contradict unfounded and untrue statements.
