Garrison Soldiers Depart From Halifax and Esquimalt-Canada's Defenders

-The Last Quebec Garrison. A milestone on Canada's road from a pioneer colony to a great nation is the departure of the last British soldiers from these shores. In March the great docks and fortifications at Halifax were handed over by the regulars to the Canadian Government, and now Esqui-Canadian Government, and now Esqui-malt is evacuated. Canada is now responsible for her own defence. In a military sense she has come of age. The change, however, is external. The incident will strike future historians and that part of the world at large 25c. 30c, 40c, 50c, 60c. per lb that is interested; in essentials nothing is altered. The chief difference is that the expense of maintaining the garri-son at Halifax and that at Esquimait will be borne directly by Canadians. Canada's Defenders.

Canada's Defenders.

Since 1855, when the foundations of our militia system were laid, Canada has been building up a defensive force of her own quite distinct from the troops that the Imperial authorities thought necessary to station here. Before that time all our officers were British, paid by the Crown, while the soldiers were Canadian yeoman. The growth of this country and that of the United States westward called attention to our tremendous frontier, to defend which would require an immensistanding army. The maintenance of such a force was clearly an impossibility, so that more and more dependence was placed upon a volunteer pendence was placed upon a volunteer service, and less and less upon the British regulars. The Trent affair and the American threat of invasion had swelled the latter force to some 18,000 men, but thenceforward the number was steadily reduced.

The Last Quebec Garrison. In 1871 the last Imperial battalion to garrison Quebec-the 60th Royal Ri-fles-embarked, and from that date onwards all the military property, save that at Halifax and that afterwards oreated at Esquimalt, B. C., was pass-ed over to Canada. It was during 1870 and 1871 that the fortifications and the and 1871 that the fortifications and the munitions of war belonging to the Imperial Government passed to the care of Canadians. The New Fort at Toronto was the first place to be given up. That was passed over on July 15, 1870. The Old Fort was transferred on Sept. 28, the same year. The Kingston fortifications came into our possession in September, 1870; the Montreal works in December of that year, and the great fortifications of Quebec on Dec. 2, 1871. The Imperial authorities retained con-The Imperial authorities retained con trol of the vast and impregnable for-tifications at Halifax and those of Esquimat, as they were important squares on the checkerboard of the naval policy.

The Influence of the Regulars. Fortunately for the enemy, it has never been necessary to prove the military worth of the British troops composing either of these garrisons. Nevertheless their influence has been an important factor in the life about them and on the histories. an important factor in the life about them, and on the history of British Columbia is deeply engraven the character of some of the officers and men who were sent there by the British War Office. The military occupation of the province dates from 1888, when a bedy of Royal Engineers body of Royal Engineers reached Esquimalt by way of Panama. The location of their camp is known even to-day as Sappertown. After the engineers came a body of carpenters and the main body of the broops. Near Sappertown there the main body of the troops. Near Sappertown there was a hamlet known as Queensborough. a name which caused some pain to the English officer in charge, who objected that a Royal name should be given to the settlement that was less important than several of its neighbors. He conferred with the colonial authorities, but they did not share his sensitiveness, and finally the matter was referred to Queen Victoria, who decreed that New Westminster should be the name of the city that was to be.

that was to be. The Building of a Province. The first Anglican church in New Westminster, Sappertown, was designed and built by the soldiers, and also the first school-house. Later they surveyed and laid out Victoria, Hope, Yale, Lytton, Douglas, Lillooet, Clinton, and Richfield, and established the lands and works department, and Government printing office in Victoria. They guarded the gold taken out of Cariboo, and published the first newspaper for British Columbia. One of said he had received letters from par-ties all over the country making inquir-les about Smith, stating they had sent him money and did not receive goods. W. H. Pook, Canadian Express agent ontinued, and the coins that issued from it are prized by numismatist to-day. As British Columbia grew in importance, and became a self-gov-erning province, the leadership of the soldiers was manifested in social life, and in sports and athletics. British Columbia is to-day the most English in outward appearance and customs of any of the provinces, largely because of the English officers and mea who have been stationed at Esquimali.

Our Defence a Problem. The cities on the coast felt particular regret at the severance of the ties that have bound the redcoats to this country. All Canada is sorry to see them go, but should ever the occasion arise, we may be sure they will hasten back again as fast as transports will carry them. In the meantime it is our duty to seriously consider the problems of defence that must now be faced.
