### WRECK OF ALGOMA STR.

Judge Houston Sits All the Crew Of ThelTheano, However, Gets Off In Boats

SOME VERY TOUGH CASES SOO STEAMER IS SUNK

Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 19.—The Algoma Central steamer Theano with a cargo of 2,000 tons of steel rails for the Grand Trunk Pacific at Fort William was sunk three miles from Thunder Cape.

The boat struck a small island while trying to make the harbor Friday night, and being washed off by a heavy sea, sank in deep water.

The crew succeeded in getting off in lifebatts, and reached Port Arthur in safety.

No Trace of Vessel.

Port Arthur, Nov. 19.—No trace of the steamer Theano could be found by a party who went out to the scene of the wreck vesterday morning on the Whalen. Only floating oil and bubbles coming to the surface of Lake Superior indicated the spot where a wreck had taken place. The steamer, with her cargo of rails, had gone to the bottom of the lake. At that point the water is 17 feet deep, and there is no likelihood of the boat being recovered.
