A public meeting will be held in the Park street Methodist Sunday school room in the evening, when Mr. Emery will deliver an address.

HEAVY TRAFFIC

DRAWN GAME

Combined Cricket Team Play in Chicago—J. W. Aitken Represents Chatham

J. W. Aitken, one of the most enthusiastic as well as one of the most proficient of the local willow wipers, has returned from Chicago, where he has been playing on the combined Chatham, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Detroit team against the Chicago Wanderers.

The team played Friday and Saturday. In the first day's play Chicago made 112 and the combined wipers, by making 158, gained a good lead. The second day, when play concluded, the visitors had five wickets to fall and needed only 38 runs to tie. "Chum" is enthusiastic over the trip and the Wanderers' hospitality.

The prospects are that a team representing the west, and composed of players from Chicago, Detroit, Chatham, Cleveland and Pittsburgh, will play the Philadelphia cricketers next year. Such a team ought to be well nigh invincible. In addition to this a full team from here will likely attend the Chicago tournament next year and will also visit Toronto.

SIGNAL CORPS

To be Added to 24th Regiment—Maxime Gun Corps to Follow

Adjutant Coltart has received the outfit for the signal corps which will soon be added to the 24th Regiment. The corps uses colored flags, called semaphores, to transmit orders on the field of action—their duties being very important.

The local corps will be in charge of Captain N. D. Harper. He will be assisted by Sergeant Graham and six men, who will be recruited especially for the purpose. The art is quite an intricate one and will require diligent study to master. A maxim gun and the requisite quota of men, therefore, will be the next acquisition to Chatham's already efficient battalion.

The new caps for the officers have arrived. They are of the naval staff pattern, heavily braided and with peaks short and close to the forehead. They present a very smart appearance.

HIGH COURT

VIGILANT'S 30 SHOTS

Riddle Big Erie Fish Poacher, the Barnhurst.

But Capt. Nick Fassel's Vessel, After An Eight-Mile Chase, Manages to Crawl Into Harbor With Upper Works In Ruins—Capt. Dunn Was Generous and Left the Tug Above Water—His Buoy Week.

Erie, Pa., Sept. 18.—The fourth of the fish tug incidents of the past week took place in mid-lake Erie yesterday, when the Canadian cruiser Vigilant riddled the big steam tug Harry G. Barnhurst with small shells from the rifle on the patrol boat.

Capt. Nick Fassel of the tug admitted after he escaped that the Vigilant could have sent her to the bottom if Capt. Dunn had so desired. They ran more than eight miles under full head of steam before they crossed the boundary line and escaped from the Canadiana.

More than thirty shots struck the vessel, and of these fifteen of the small shells landed with telling effect on the upper parts, so the boat careened to one side with the mass of wreckage when she came into port.

Having been used for merely a pleasure steamer the Barnhurst is of large size and well fitted with steam equipment.

Fireman Fainted.
The fireman, Magnus Johnson, fainted in the hold from over-exertion in keeping the steamer going ahead. He was reported killed, but revived after reaching shore.

Two fishermen were cut in the face by splinters shot away by the bullets. The Barnhurst, according to Capt. Fassel, was about five miles over the line drawn by the Vigilant.

The other Erie tugs, the Valiant and the Boyd, were also over the line and ran away when the chase started.

Capt. Dunn ordered the Barnhurst to stop, but instead of doing so Capt. Fassel put on full steam and started for the line. He took a southwesterly direction and could not be headed by the Vigilant.

It has become quite the custom for the Erie fishermen to cross the line, regardless of strict orders, and the companies employing them, and having exciting brushes with the Vigilant. The Barnhurst lost a quantity of nets.

"VIGILANT" TAKES THIS ONE.

Erie Fishing Tug Is Captured in Canadian Waters.

Detroit, Sept. 18.—An Erie (Pa.) dispatch says the Keystone Fish Co. received a telegram from Port Dover, Ont., late Friday, sent by Capt. Morrison of their tug E. C. Oggel, a 65-foot boat, saying the fish tug had been captured and taken into port by a Canadian cruiser Vigilant, while fishing in Canadian waters.

The captain, engineer and four men on the boat were taken to Port Dover, and the tug, valued at \$2,000, will be held pending a settlement of the case.

SCHR. KETCHUM BURNS.

Mate Anderson and Mrs. Ames, The Cook, Are Lost.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Sept. 18.—The schooner V. H. Ketchum, bound from Duluth to Cleveland, byed Saturday night off Parisian Island, Lake Superior, and two members of the crew were drowned while attempting to leave the burning vessel in a boat. It was seen that the fire was beyond control the nine members of the crew, including Mrs. D. Ames, cook, launched the boat and prepared to row to the steamer Nottingham, close at hand. In attempting to lower the woman into the boat the craft was capsized, and was borne down by the weight of the helpless woman, and both sank to death.

WE CELEBRATE ON OCT. 21.

Whole Empire to Join in Nelson Centennial.

London, Sept. 18.—One hundred years ago last Thursday His son embarked at Portsmouth on his ship, the Victory, for the voyage which crowned his marvelous life and made him a British national asset for all time.

That day was the occasion of the launching of a movement for a centenary memorial under the auspices of Lord Brassey, Lord Kinnaird, Sir Thomas Sutherland and many other distinguished people.

Oct. 21 all parts of the British Empire will celebrate the Nelson centennial. In the afternoon of that day there will be a great gathering at the Albert Hall, followed by a big evening concert.

Collections are now being started, the proceeds of which will be devoted to the benefit of the royal mercantile and fishing fleets.

Dates For Election Trials.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—Before Mr. Justice Magee at Osgoode Hall on Saturday counsel discussed the most convenient dates for the trial of election petitions not yet disposed of, and reached the following: The Sault Ste. Marie petition will be tried in Toronto to October 7, Monck October 19, Welland, West Huron, North Norfolk, South Norfolk, October 7, South Ontario October 2. The dates have not been fixed for Prince Edward Island and South Oxford.

Dr. Osler as Lecturer.
London, Sept. 18.—Dr. Osler has accepted the post as lecturer of medicine at St. George's Hospital, London, next spring, and will give a series of lectures on the diagnosis of abdominal tumors.

Mrs. Neil Burgess Dead.

MAYOR ACTS

By-Law to Be put Through at To-night's Session to Oust P. M. from Head St.

Some time ago the Mayor was given power to act in the Head street spur matter. The result is that at to-night's session of the City Council he will introduce a resolution that the tracks be removed.

This is the result of a conference with the city solicitor, who has but recently returned. For thirty days after the passing of the resolution objections to it will be received. If there are any they will be heard and taken into consideration.

KILLED BY A TRAIN.

Unknown Man Run Down by Freight Near Port Hope.

Port Hope, Sept. 18.—An unknown man was struck and instantly killed by a freight train between 7 and 8 o'clock Saturday night.

The body is that of a man between 35 and 40 years of age, about 5 feet in height, and 200 pounds in weight, and of a fair complexion.

He was rather poorly clothed, in a dark grey tweed suit, and a small coin was all the money found in the pockets, along with several small articles. The dead man is believed to have been a Frenchman, who had been noticed wandering about the neighborhood during the afternoon. The only wound inflicted was a deep gash on the back of the head.

Small Boy's Wanderings.

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—George Prudhomme, aged 4-1/2 years, strayed from his home on Thursday. He has been located in Montreal in the Chenaille street police station, but how he got there is a mystery. The Montreal police found him on the streets. He is too young to tell anything about it. He evidently strayed down to the Central station and got on board a train.

Race Fight in Tennessee.

Germantown, Tenn., Sept. 18.—A clash between white men and negroes occurred here Saturday, in which Eugene Scott, a constable, was shot and stabbed; a negro named Smith, from Cordova was killed, Robert Harr of Germantown was cut about the head, and three or more negroes shot. Fifty or more shots were exchanged. The trouble arose over a race.

Came Back With His Man.

Shanghai, Sept. 18.—The British Vice-Consul, who left here last Friday for Quinsan to secure the release of a British subject held prisoner there by the Chinese authorities, returned yesterday with the man.
