The Government's Answer.

Sir Wilfred Laurier has answered the demand of the Dominion Alliance for legislation in conformity with the results of the plebiscite vote, by a letter addressed to its secretary, Mr. Spence.

The plebiscite was unasked for by the temperance people. It has meant a great deal of expense to the country directly. It has cost the friends of the measure a great deal of money, of labor and of anxiety.

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Had 279,000 voters declared in favor of almost any other measure, their demand would never have been so lightly brushed aside.

It is time we showed that we are earnest in this matter. We have had enough of Ryal C. Commissioner and of Plebiscite. Both parties have been given a most fair and impartial trial.

The public meeting of the ratepayers which is advertised in this issue for Wednesday evening next will decide upon matters of very grave importance to the town.

The scheme which is proposed will necessitate the expenditure of a considerable amount of money, and the increasing to a large extent the municipal debt.

Our citizens should make it a point to study the question carefully and to present to a man on Wednesday evening a matter of this kind to more hands of citizens should be allowed to decide for the whole town, not should the step be taken without full discussion and careful consideration.

Conference of Boards of Trade.

The first conference of the various boards of trade of the province met in Halifax on Monday and Tuesday of this week.

Among the matters discussed of great interest to this valley were those relating to the apple and potato freight rates on the D. A. R., ocean freight rates on apples from Halifax to England, and the proposed abolition of subsidies to freight steamers.

A fairly strong case was made against a railway in regard to apple and potato rates. The Superintendent of the road, in reply, practically admitted the justice of the complaint so far as potato freights are concerned.

The question of abolition of freight subsidies met with considerable discussion. The speakers favoring such a change took the ground that the present subsidies were used as a means of stifling competition and maintaining a monopoly of freights with correspondingly excessive charges.

The delegates from the provincial Boards together with the members of the Legislature were entertained by the Halifax Board at a banquet on Tuesday evening at the Halifax Hotel.

The fraternal visit paid by W. J. H. Division to Cornwallis Division, at Canada, on Monday evening, was a most successful and enjoyable event.

Mr. Milford Fosby leads the prayer meeting in the Baptist church in Middleboro next Sunday, and on the following Sunday will preach there.

Mr. Roland Chute has resumed work with Mr. Arthur Porter, who has contracted to build a house and barn for Mr. Ernest Wood, in Woodville, to replace those lost by fire last autumn.

The campaign against the liquor dealers goes merrily on in the shiretown. A committee composed of the minister, and one representative from each of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist churches has been appointed for the purpose of receiving information and laying complaints before the Inspector.

The new Allan Line Steamer Cadillac, launched at Belfast, Jan. 14th, left Portland on Saturday afternoon last, for Halifax with fifty passengers, 800 head of stock and a large and valuable cargo of merchandise.

Dr. A. P. Reid, who is now engaged in working up a plan for a sanatorium for consumptives to be established in this province, says that fifteen hundred boys continue die every year of consumption and there is no reason why at least 75 per cent. or 1000 of them should not be kept living, clear of disease, and self-supporting.
