He did not say what for, nor give any particulars. The letter was written in France the day fighting ceased, Nov. 11th. He has seen much hard fighting the past year and said that at times severe hardship was a mild way of expressing it, but when he saw the great joy and happiness of the French people, in the towns and cities which the Canadian captured and released these poor people who had been in German captivity for four years, he thanked God he had enlisted and done his duty by fighting for right and justice.

The Children's Aid Society.

To The Editor of The Acadian.

DEAR SIR,—The annual meeting of this excellent Society though widely announced, was only poorly attended. The small attendance did not, however, prevent the transaction of a good deal of business, the most interesting and important of which was the annual report of Mr. Herbert Stairs. During the past year Mr. Stairs has done an immense amount of arduous and thankless work on behalf of the neglected children of Kings county with his usual thoroughness and efficiency. Since the inception of the Society, forty-one children have been rescued from deplorable surroundings and associations and cut off for and far larger number have been suitably fitted by the agent's efforts, and wise and judicious advice.

Mrs. Patiquale, the treasurer, has also done splendid work and has most ably looked after the business interests of the Society.

The president, Rev. G. W. Miller, whom I had the great pleasure and privilege of re-commissioning, has been indefatigable in his efforts on behalf of the work, and has proved himself well worthy of the honor conferred upon him.

Last but not least I may mention Dr. Elliott, also re-elected vice-president, who has found time with his large and ever increasing practice to give generous aid to the Society as medical adviser.

I had almost forgotten Judge Webster and Mr. Harold Chase, of Kentville, who have also aided the Society with professional advice.

I am glad to say that the County Council has at last been induced to make an annual grant to the work of the Society, which starts its fourth year's work with considerably improved prospects. But as yet the support accorded by the general public has been far below what might reasonably be expected.

The importance of the work done by the Society it would be almost impossible to exaggerate, and it is only beginning. To rescue children from lives of ignorance and neglect and deplorable surroundings, and from conditions wherein a normally healthy upbringing is practically an impossibility, and to give them a fair chance of growing up into useful citizens, is a work which manifestly commends itself to all men and women of good will, and needs, one would think, only to be known to arouse the warm widespread support and co-operation of the general public. Perhaps the fault is partly with the Society in not more widely advertising its work, it is more of which so far as to its main object, which is to rescue, and most efficient labors of Mr. H. Stairs.
