Ottawa July 6-The statement of revenue and expenditure of the diminion for the twelve months ended June 30 last shows a revenue increase of ?8,531,802 over the previous year.

The expenditure was \$54,006,599 an increase of \$3,781, 727 over last year.

The capital expenditure for the same time increased from \$10,984. 322 to \$12,727, 867 or nearly \$2,-

The revenue for the month of June increased by over \$800,000, and the expenditure by about \$400-
