Brush Fires on Gaspe Coast.

Quebec, June 30.—Brush fires are raging down the Gaspe Coast. Pabos suffering to the extent of \$30,000. Twenty-seven buildings including those surrounding the mills of King Bros. at Pabos, together with a million feet of lumber have been destroyed. These include the telegraph office and store and residence of McNaughton, manager of the King plant. Extensive mills were only saved with great difficulty. The fire is now advancing in the direction of the village of Newport, six miles distant. Rain is badly needed down the coast.

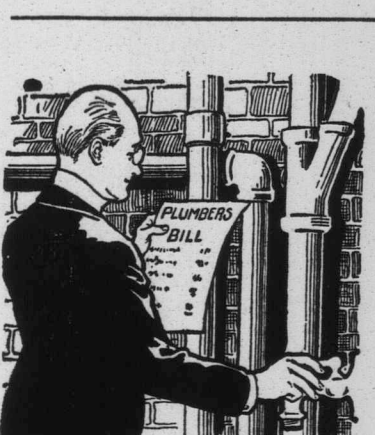
