short time ago the City Council Five employes of the Providence R. I das Co., went to their death in the cellar of the Westfield street gas holder in that city about 1.30 o'clockon Wednesday afternoon, asphixiation by gas being the cause. The accident was a peculiar one. For several days leaking gas had seen detected in the holder, and on Wednesday the company sent six men and a foreman to repair the leak, which proved to come from a defective valve onnecting the four-inch main which upplies the Westfield street holder with gas from the main holder on Globe street. The men had just returned from dinner, and on going down the wooden stairs which lead from the entrance of the holder to the cellar below began to work on the valve They disconnected it, and tied a cloth bag about the large main, extending it in from the street. The bag gave way, syrup. and an immense volume of gas rushed out. In less time than it takes to tell it Soon after three o'clock the Gas Company sent a gang of men to dig up t being understood that no other mean of shutting off the gas could be attained and even then it meant two hour work.
