The Federal Government are eminently sustaining their record for extravagance in the public expenditure.

New Imperial Government.

The members of the Balfour Government gave up their seals of office on Monday of this week and their successors in office assumed their respective positions in the new administration.

The British conservative morning newspapers are compelled to admit that Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman has succeeded in forming a much stronger administration than had been thought possible.

It is generally admitted that Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman has formed a cabinet of clever men, many of whom have distinguished themselves outside the domain of politics.

Ripon, already referred to, are practically laid aside.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman is now in his seventieth year, having been born at Stratcathro, Forfarshire, on Sept. 7th, 1836, the youngest son of Sir James Campbell.

Russia's Troubles Continue.

St. Petersburg, Saturday Evening.—Another crisis is at hand, involving the indefinite prolongation of the strike, the probable immediate starting of a general strike, and a possible final struggle between the government and the proletariat.

As the strikers were withdrawing, a Cossack patrol came galloping to the rescue. One of the strikers turned and threw an imitation bomb, and the Cossacks wheeled in order to avoid what they presumed to be a deadly missile.

News of the arrest of Krustaleff created an immense sensation among the workmen. All the socialist, labor and kindred organizations are holding a meeting to-night in which most inflammatory speeches are being made.

Premiers and Councils

A London cable announcing a change in the Imperial order of precedence, and giving recognition to the premier, contains the following news: "This fact causes the Daily Chronicle to remind the public that there is no such person as the premier or prime minister of Canada."

The Presidents Message.

President Roosevelt delivered his annual message to Congress at Washington on the 5th. The message opens by saying that the people of his country continue to enjoy prosperity and continue, in part, as follows: "The fortunes amassed through Corporation organization are now so large, and vast, such power lies in those that wield them, as to make it a matter of necessity to give to the Sovereign, that is to the Government, some effective power of supervision over their corporate use."

A Destructive Fire.

What proved to be a rather disastrous fire was discovered in the dry goods store of Weeks & Co. Queen Street, a few minutes after ten o'clock Saturday night. The store had been closed for the night about a quarter to ten and about half an hour afterwards smoke was observed rolling into Queen Street from the rear of the premises.
