A curious point in the law on voters' lists came before Judge Sinclair, at Stoney Creek. A young man named Marshall Hopkins asked to be put on the list as a farmer's son. It came out during the examination that Marshall is living on a farm which is owned and run by his mother, who is separated and living apart from his father. The question arose: Is the woman a farmer for the purposes of the Voters' List Act. Decision was reserved.

The Tory Jonah.

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When Hon. Alex. Mackenzie left Lambton to visit West York from the Tories, his enemies taunted him with being afraid to face the music in his old constituency, as his former supporters had gone back on him. Mr. Mackenzie replied at the time, saying that he felt confident that Lambton would prove true to Liberal principles. And so she did, and her record at the last election was a grand one. Some idea of the esteem in which Mr. Mackenzie is still held there can be had when we state that a few days ago a deputation of the leading Reformers of Lambton waited on their former representative, and presented him with an address and \$5,500 in cash. Mr. Mackenzie also can have the proud consciousness of having unhorsed one of the noisiest champions of the Tory party, and brought East York into line again.
