The Boethic, which left here shortly after the Adventure, passed her at 10 a.m. Saturday, beating her to Pool's Island by a few minutes. The Adventure left Greenspond at 4.30 p.m. Saturday and in company with the Bellaventure lay off this port from 1 a.m. yesterday, as it was very thick with snow. Over 800 men were brought up to go out in the various ships with their boxes and bags.

Fierce Snow Storm.

Saturday night at 10 o'clock snow began to fall, and before midnight a regular blizzard was raging. It moderated a little yesterday forenoon but by 1 o'clock recommenced and during the afternoon was worse than ever. It became very cold last evening and few ventured forth to the various churches in the city. The street car service was put out of commission and the streets were blocked with the drift. A northerly gale blew last night and countrywards there is fully 10 feet of snow, fences being covered and vehicular traffic suspended. Not for many years did people witness such a storm in the month of March.

Received Very Dangerous Wound.

As William Churchill, of Protestant Town, Portugal Cove, was cutting the limbs of a tree which he had cut down Saturday afternoon, the sharp axe he used slipped and the blade taking his left leg inflicted a bad cut fully 8 inches long and very deep. Some large veins were exposed being severed. The man lost a great quantity of blood. Solomon Greeley, who is skillful at such stitches, the wound after putting a ligature over it stopping the flow of blood. The man will likely be taken to Hospital to-day.

The speeches made were fluent and logical and showed that much attention was given to the subject by the various speakers. The verdict was a draw. Next Saturday another debate will be held in which the senior students will take part.

Health Report.

There are in the Hospital at present eight cases of typhus and four of typhoid fever. The past week only one case of typhus and one death occurred from the disease. A house in which there was lately a case of scarlet fever was disinfected and released from quarantine last Friday. The patient has recovered.

B. I. S. Meeting

Rev. Father Clarke, P. F. of T. Honored.

At the annual meeting of the evlent Irish Society held here at noon a resolution was passed unanimously to present a paper addressed to Rev. M. J. Clarke, P. F. of T., who is about to leave Newfoundland for good. Hon. J. D. the President, occupied the chair after adding two new members to the roll and receiving the report of the committee in charge of the past St. Patrick's Day, the principal object of the meeting was taken. Mr. Higgins, who made a complimentary speech to Father Clarke in giving that address he presented him, he referred to all the work that Father Clarke had done for the cause of education and religion at Torbay and the general uplifting of the people. There was so well known that it was less to speak of it. His duty will be generally received. As Clarke is a member of the Society a worthy son of the Emerald Isle was only fitting that the B. I. S. present him with an address. Mr. J. Lacey, Chairman of the B. I. S. Committee, who presided at the meeting, paid a glowing tribute to rev. pastor. Speeches appropriate to the subject before the assembly were made by Messrs. J. M. Devine, Burke, J. P. Croft, J. J. Phipps, E. L. Carter, Mr. Burke's remarks were particularly interesting and had been associated with the gentleman for many years as Superintendent of Education and to speak from personal experience the zeal that the rev. pastor of Torbay had always shown in the cause of education. Mr. Burke had an opportunity of observing the state of education in Canada, but he never seen anything to equal it in Torbay. The President said a word in support of the resolution which, on being put to the vote was carried unanimously. The president then announced that he had received an invitation from the Torbay Irish Society of Boston to attend their annual celebration, which the meeting adjourned till Sunday.
