

C.E.T.S. Meeting.

The Lord Bishop filled the chair at the C. E. T. S. meeting held last night at the Synod Hall. The meeting was the opening of the winter campaign. The attendance was large and enthusiastic was a manifest. Amongst those present were Rev. J. W. Bartlett, Mrs. Peters, of the W. C. T. U., Lieut.-Col. Rees, I. C. Morris, of the I. O. G. T., and several other prominent workers in the temperance cause. Mr. Geo. J. Coughlin, of the T. A. & Society, sent a note expressing his regret that he could not attend.

After a hymn and prayer had been recited the Lord Bishop addressed the meeting. He congratulated the Society on the large attendance saying that it was no doubt an indicator of a good winter's work. The C. E. T. S. had each season worked with a well defined object and in the present campaign would be no exception. Work and not talk was required, and the C. E. T. S. members were all workers. It was a gratification to know that they had the loyal support of hosts of friends who did not belong to the Society, they were all willing to help. Quoting from a letter received from the Secretary of the City Council the Lord Bishop said that there were 100 houses unfit for human habitation—about five hundred people living in insanitary houses. We should try to get a better place for them to spend their spare hours than in the saloons and grog shops to which they are driven by reason of their uncomfortable surroundings in their homes. Our appeal to the Licensing Board to reduce the number of saloons was quite reasonable and if the other temperance bodies would back us up we would certainly succeed. When temptation is reduced drunkenness is reduced. I am better class people would become total abstainers they would do more good than if they spent all their goods in so-called works of charity.

Rev. Mr. Bell then moved the following resolution:—

Be it Resolved:—That the Society gratefully acknowledge its profound satisfaction at the Temperance measures passed last March by the Legislature, and congratulate the kindred Societies and fellow-workers in the cause on the splendid unanimity shown in their endeavour to promote Temperance Reform, as the Society is of the opinion that these measures have already increased the daily amount of liquor consumed in St. John's and will eventually produce a marked diminution in drunkenness.

The Housing Problem:—That the Society hall with much gratification the effort which is being made to remedy and improve the housing of the poor, and pledge itself to give the movement its full support.

A Public Analyst:—That the Society strongly recommend the immediate appointment of a duly qualified analyst in order that Sections 22, 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27 of the Licensing Act, 1906, may be enforced properly and in order that the public generally may know the percentage of alcohol contained in the different medicated wines, some of which are known to be highly alcoholic and therefore liable to be brought under the provisions of the said Act.

The Licensing Board:—That the Society having for the past four years protested vigorously against the excessive number of licensed houses in the city, has still to deplore the fact that any attempt that may have been made to reduce them in compliance with the law, has not proved effective and again urges that the Licensing Board carry out the spirit and intent of the law in this particular.

In Conclusion:—That the Society emphasise the necessity and importance of personal work and individual responsibility on the part of every citizen in helping to put down the most prevalent vice in our midst, and should conditions prove such that public opinion demand that another appeal be made to the electorate of St. John's District to adopt Local Option with the rest of the Colony, the Society believes it could claim

the fullest support of the electors, as it has persistently used all its moral powers of persuasion to bring about 2nd, 1911.

Mr. Bell made a forceful speech in putting forward the resolution. He said that it was the 5th in which the Society had taken up a Resolution on Temperance, each one being on some particular phase of the question. Progress had been made in every case though it may not have been always apparent. It was a great thing to have the continued support of His Lordship the Bishop on all those occasions, and to quote the words of the Hon. D. Morrison in the House of Assembly last winter, “The Lord Bishop was a tower of strength in the Temperance cause.” He has been a consistent advocate for temperance reform ever since the beginning of his episcopate here 33 years ago! The C. E. T. S. were proud of this fact. Much had been done in the way of Temperance Reform in Newfoundland but much more remained to be accomplished. They must not sit down and be content but rather get up and work. Ever since the Local Option campaign of 1909 the sentiment in favour of temperance had increased in St. John's in a very hopeful degree. United action was the great lever, and temperance people knew this well and would act accordingly. There was no doubt that the temperance legislation of 1910 and 1911 has made a great improvement in the city. While liquor is to be had there will be always drunken people. Many of those arrested are old offenders and black listers. One, he was told, had been convicted 14 times, another, 9 times, and those cases help to make things appear to the public worse than they really are. It has been said often that drunkenness can be reduced if those who sell liquor to drunken men were watched more closely and punished when caught. It was also thought that the liquor being analyzed would help to lessen the drunkenness. Medicated wines sold in the grocery stores should be analyzed and the proprietors not permitted to sell them when they contain the 2½ per cent. of alcohol. The sale of these wines was demoralizing the people of the outports who were in the habit of getting them from St. John's.

The C. E. T. S. was glad to see that the Housing Problem was taken up. He hoped that the Licensing Board would reduce the number of licensed houses. He exhorted all the temperance people to stand united and keep up the good fight till the flag of temperance floated over the whole island.

Mr. R. G. MacDonald seconded the resolution and strongly endorsed the idea of having a public analyst. The temperance sentiment was gaining ground all over the world. Drinkers are being passed over by business men and the sober men are sought for in every walk of life.

Mr. Hayward spoke in support of the movement and strongly favoured the appointment of an analyst.

Mr. I. C. Morris the veteran temperance worker, bearing the scars of 10 years of field work, warmly endorsed the movement and congratulated the Society on the good beginning of their winter work.

Rev. J. W. Bartlett, Lieut.-Col. Rees and Rev. Canon Temple having backed up the resolution in short speeches, Benediction was pronounced by the Bishop.

Panama to Have the Largest Docks in the World.

In contemplating the great engineering problem being solved in the construction of the Panama Canal, the people of the United States have almost forgotten that the plans for the big “ditch” also provide for the largest and most completely equipped harbor and dock system in the world to be located at the Pacific end of the canal. A strip of land along the water front two miles in length has been reserved for the docks, and while but two-thirds of this will be immediately improved, the improvements thus provided for embrace construction work that will give the turning basin alone an area of 271 acres. There will be a series of piers on either side of the canal entrance, each of which will be 1,000 feet long. The width of the canal between the pier ends will be 3,000 feet. A page illustration in the October number of Popular Mechanics Magazine gives a clear idea of the dock and harbor facilities.

The piers will be 1,000 feet long, and the slips between them will be 300 feet wide. The length of the piers permit the docking of any one of them of two vessels 400 feet long or three vessels 300 feet long on either side or both sides at once. The width of the slips between the piers will permit a vessel to lie in the slip with steam barges on either side for the trans-shipment of freight.

"Cave Canem."

By the Carthaginian yesterday the Horwood Lumber Co. imported from London a large and powerful dog which will be set at large nightly around their yards and building to watch the place. Suspicious characters are often seen around the premises at night and time again material has been stolen. The dog, which is strong and sagacious, is of the species known as the "Airedale Terrier", and trained by Major Richardson of London, who supplies the London and Paris police forces with them. Not long since several were sent by the Major with a British punitive expedition in India. These dogs will carefully watch suspicious people at night, are so powerful that they can hold a strong man, and the company believe that the animal will be more useful to them than a corps of watchmen.

An Interesting Exhibit.

There are now on exhibition in Messrs. Ayre & Sons' Hardware Window two pieces of wood which have been used to test the respective qualities of Copper Paint and what is now so well known in Newfoundland—SOLIGNUM—as preservatives against the attacks of sea worms and insects. Both pieces have recently been taken from the waters of the harbor and before being immersed, one piece was treated with a well known brand of Copper Paint for four inches along either end, the intervening space being left unpainted. The other piece of wood had one end covered with SOLIGNUM. A glance at the two sticks now shows no comparison between the two preparations as a preventive against the destroying insects, for whereas the wood of the Copper Painted stick is so eaten away as to have lost its original outline, and showing thousands of holes caused by worms, that of the SOLIGNUM covered stick is the same as when placed in the water. Knife Thrust in His Heart.

Moorhead, Minn., Sept. 26.—That it is possible to recover from the effects of a knife thrust in the heart is being proven by Frank Grover, who eight

days ago was stabbed during a controversy over a poker game. At first it was thought that Grover would die, and his assailant, W. N. Little, was arrested. Although Grover had five ribs removed and several stitches put in his heart, it is now stated by the surgeons that he has a good chance for recovery.

Twenty-Four Hours on Cliff Face.

Adventure of a Young Climber.

The mystery of the young visitor to Clovelly, North Devon, who disappeared during a walk along the cliffs last Thursday afternoon was solved late the following evening. The visitor, Arthur Oldham, only arrived at Clovelly with his mother on Thursday morning from Westward Ho. When at night he failed to return from his first walk a search was instituted, but had no result.

When the search was resumed on Friday a young farmer named Pomeroy assisted. Just when the quest was about to be given up for the day it was after sunset—Pomeroy, in the course of a close inspection of a very precipitous cliff near Hartland Point, observed an apparently lifeless body lying on a ledge of the cliff. After a very hazardous climb Pomeroy discovered Oldham in a state of exhaustion. He carried him some distance before coming up with the other members of the search party. A moment later, when Mrs. Oldham arrived, there was an affecting meeting with her son.

After medical attention, Oldham recovered sufficiently to be able to indicate the cause of his twenty-four hours' exposure to the cold on the cliffs. He had, it appeared, attempted to scale the cliff, but lost his nerve and could neither go forward nor return the way he had come.—Daily Mail, Sept. 18.

No Confidence in the Government.

Mr. Deakin Opposes the Preference System in Australia.

Melbourne, Sept. 26.—Mr. Deakin in the Federal House has tabled a motion of want of confidence in the Government in consequence of the preference system introduced by Mr. O'Malley on behalf of the Government.

It is not expected that the Ministry will be defeated, and the move is regarded as merely a tactical one in order to arouse the electorate.

Keep Your Eyes On--

How Some Tiny Towns, British and Foreign, are Saying "Wait and See."

Quite a lot of things are happening in the world just now that will revolutionise the geography books. Ten years hence schoolboys will probably be complaining that they have a lot more big cities to learn about than their elder brothers of to-day. For just as Chicago jumped in a few years from a small and ugly town to be one of the world's biggest cities, so there are many mighty cities of the near future that are now only in their babyhood.

To-day, you may not even have heard their names. There is, for instance, Honolulu, a small port on a dot of an island in the heart of the Pacific.

The opening of the Panama Canal—now due in two years—will make Honolulu rank with Liverpool and Hamburg. It will be the hub of the Pacific, a half-way house to everywhere, and the Pacific, all geographers are agreed, is going to become busier and busier at the expense of the Atlantic.

The criss-cross of steamer routes from New York and Europe to Japan, from Vancouver to Australia, from San Francisco to the Orient will all help to boom Honolulu. Its population will jump to hundreds of thousands, and its steamer traffic will rank with Liverpool's.

Another Big Naval Base.

Are there any of our own towns with big prospects? One, perhaps two. The certainty is Dunfermline. Dunfermline is the only town at the back of the big new naval base that is steadily taking shape behind the Forth Bridge.

Even now Dunfermline is feeling the effects of the huge wages bill, and of the housing of hundreds of workmen. Dunfermline is a few miles inland, but it is steadily spreading down towards the sea.

It is in the heart of a coal country, and with a big naval base Dunfermline will in fifteen or twenty years be a second Portsmouth, with a population over the hundred thousand mark. Dunfermline is steadily preparing itself for great things.

So, too, is Galway, the nearest port to the New World. If Galway gets that fast three-days' steamer-service to Canada that has been talked about so long, its future is assured, as its straight railway line to Dublin will bring American passengers two whole days nearer London.

Galway should boom more rapidly than Fishguard has boomed. And with luck and enterprise there is no reason, seeing its great advantage of position, why it should not try to overhaul Liverpool as a liner terminus.

Have you ever heard of that pretty-named place, Prince Rupert? It is just now a tiny, rainy town on the Pacific Coast of Canada. It is only a makeshift place of wooden houses, but four years ago it did not exist at all.

Australia's New Capital.

It is the western terminus of the new through route across Canada—the Grand Trunk line. It talks cheerfully of throwing into quite a lot of cocked hats Vancouver, the best port at the end of the Canadian Pacific, hitherto the only through route. And the chances are it will, too, for Prince Rupert is five hundred miles nearer Japan, as well as a day nearer the Atlantic.

There is Yass Canberra, too, only a site yet, but a site that Australia has settled on for its new capital—a capital that for beauty of plan and architecture all Australia is finally determined to make "The Paris of the Southern Hemisphere." All the world's architects have been invited to compete.

Livingstone, too, the town at the foot of the Victoria Falls, means to be the biggest city in Africa, for there are very serious schemes on foot to apply the power of the Falls to running the mines and railways of the whole sub-continent.

The Falls are twice as high as Niagara, more than twice as long, and will give over 30,000,000 horsepower. When Livingstone gets going, she means to make the rest of the world stare. —Pearson's Weekly.
