LONDON, To-Day. With the exception of Roumania all the Balkan countries are placing their armies on a war footing. As et no step has been taken indicating he outbreak of hostilities.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-Day. Last night it was announced that the Foreign Minister was still with-out any communication from Bulgaria Servia. No definite move in the way of combined action on the part of the great Powers has been made. Short of actual hostilities, however, the situation could hardly be worse. The report that Turkey has decided to seize all Greek vessels in Turkish waters has an especially warlike apearance, while it is further reported nat Greece is about to proclaim the annexation of Crete, an act which Turkey has repeatedly declared would considered as a casus belli.


