The Change.

The complete change of front with regard to Selective Conscription, which has been brought about in Government circles and particularly in the case of the Government papers, must be regarded, not as an indication that the force of popular opinion made it incumbent on them to make provision for such a measure. No person who has closely, or even superficially, followed the various moves of the National (?) Administration during the six months preceding the opening of the House on Tuesday, could have failed to notice the utter unwillingness of the members to move in any way toward a set policy until a declaration was imposed upon them, and no credit is due them for anything that has been done by the Soldiers, who have succeeded in raising by voluntary enlistment the 300 men asked for in the Colonial Office dispatch of April 9th. But, as pointed out many times, that number is not sufficient, and the alarming news has reached us that over five hundred men in England, trained or untrained, will tend to put new life into the ranks of the battalions in France, and will prevent its being split up and divided amongst other regiments, thus losing its identity. Prompt action alone will obviate such a course. The realization that the situation is serious is communicating itself to all parts of the Empire and Canada is taking the measures to reinforce her fighting men at the front. Newfoundland's duty also lies in that direction. It is not enough to make speeches praising the Regiment for its gallantry. The whole world knows of the heroism of the Royal Newfoundlanders to-day. Neither is sufficient to address laudatory sentences and eloquent periods to large and distinguished audiences. Quit talking and send men. It is good to have them ready, but it is better to send them, and best of all to know that by their going new heart will be put into the breasts of those who are bearing the burden of the battle.

The member for Port de Grave, in moving the address in reply, has shown the people the huge rates of interest which is being paid by the country on the foreign loans raised by the Government since 1913. In that he has done more service than he wots of. He showed that the taxpayers are being mulcted of 7 1/2 per cent interest, while millions of dollars are lying inactive in the Savings Banks drawing the paltry rate of 3 per cent; thus making, or helping to make, increases in the dividends of Bank stockholders. No better reason than this can be urged in favor of a local loan for strictly war purposes, and notwithstanding any opposition the floating of a such a loan may meet in certain quarters, it must be put on the market. It would be criminal to go outside the Dominion to borrow money with so much at our disposal, and we trust that the proposed Victory Loan will be made so attractive and issued in such denominations as to make the purchase within the reach of every person who has so small a sum as twenty dollars to invest. Make the issue a popular one and let every man, woman and child in Newfoundland have an opportunity to do something toward helping win the war for democracy.

Returned Soldiers, Attention.

We beg to draw the attention of the unemployed returned soldiers that within the next fortnight a large number of Government officials have joined the colors, and as a consequence their positions are yet to be filled. As you are the ones most entitled to the job, be up and doing. We might suggest the pilot service for some and the Post Office for others. The latter, however, thanks to the efforts of the P. M. G. is giving the returned men the first opportunity.

Firemen Ask Increase.

At a meeting of the Firemen's Union, held last night, it was decided to notify the employers that the stationary firemen will shortly seek an increase in wages. The firemen employed on the Reid Nfld. Co.'s boats are also demanding more wages. It was agreed that the men stand for \$70 a month for the Sydney, Halifax and New York routes, and \$80 a month for boats running to the Old Country.

Selective Conscription

ENDORSED BY ST. GEORGE'S ANGLICAN POPULATION.

SANDY POINT, To-day.
Let the Government only have the course of their convictions and pass a Selective Conscription Bill as quickly as possible, for that is the only sure way of getting men for our Regiment. They will find all loyal Newfoundlanders ready to support them in carrying out such a measure, if the trumpet gives no uncertain sound who will prepare himself for the battle? The Government must be the trumpet in this case. Away with uncertainty, and do what the whole country recognizes must be done, and that quickly. My parishioners in Bay St. George only number 1,400, and already 70 of our lads have been accepted for the army and navy, just 5 per cent. Of these 15 have been killed and wounded, and one is a prisoner in Germany. We have others ready to go, but our people feel it is most unjust that all our lads should be sacrificed, while certain places in this district, not to speak of others with a far greater population, have hardly sent a man yet. To my mind the principle of any law is to teach a man his duty to the State, and insist on his doing it. There are some who will never recognize their duty, as far as the Royal Nfld. Regiment is concerned, and in justice to all, a law should be passed as has been done in other parts of the Empire, insisting that every man who enjoys the privilege of British rule shall do his duty when called upon. Go ahead, Mr. Premier, give us Selective Conscription, and you will find the people at your back in all parts of the Dominion. I can answer for my people in this respect, and although they have done perhaps as well as the best, they are ready to do still more, when those who hang back are ordered to the front to bear their portion of the sacrifice, and not enjoy privileges at the expense of ours.

Escaped Prisoner Captured.

LIVED HIGH LIFE WHEN FREE.

Thomas Robar, alias Edward A. Meaden, who broke jail on Friday, the 19th inst., while working at Government House Grounds, and has since been at large, was rounded up yesterday afternoon by Detective Whalen, at the Regimental Headquarters, where he had offered for enlistment under the assumed name of Edward A. Meaden. Since gaining his unlawful freedom, Robar has been living near Virginia Waters, where he had pitched his tent in a quiet spot, sheltered by tall trees and most unlikely to be seen by persons living, or passing, in that neighborhood. After making his getaway from the quarters he owned by Patrick Hickey, a gardener at Government House, he made his way towards Quidi Vidi Lake, and under cover of darkness forced an entrance to the summer residence of Mr. W. F. Shortall, where it is supposed he spent the first night. Finding himself in safe quarters he carefully laid his plans for a camping expedition. Again under the cover of darkness he started to shift to his new abode at Virginia Waters, taking with him the following articles, viz., a valise, a kettle, troutling outfit, cups, saucers, plates, etc., shooting outfit, pictures, boys' camping outfit, bed clothing and pillows, rugs, flags, boys' socks, towels, pair tennis shoes, table cloth, hand grip filled with books, lady's coat, camera, bell, tea, sugar, butter, boy's express baggon, cigar holder and pipe, pocket book and wallet, in all valued at \$142. He appeared before Judge Morris last morning, and was remanded. Robar or Meaden is a native of Nova Scotia, and is 18 years of age. Jail breaking is a serious offence, and it looks as if the "captured bird" will be confined to the cage for some time.

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Thoughts Upon the Times.

The introduction of Selective Conscription and the floating of a Victory Loan, as foreshadowed in the Speech from the Throne, will be welcomed by every patriotic and right-thinking man in the Dominion. We should have had both three years ago. When other countries were seriously busy conscripting both its man-power and wealth, we busied ourselves with the small petty questions of the moment. To-day we see its results. As we have sown so shall we reap. The Government deserve no credit whatever for waking up at last to its responsibilities. It is to be hoped that their death-bed repentance is not too late. The attempt to further extend the life of the present Government will not prove acceptable to the majority of the people of this country at the present time. If it has to come, it should not extend beyond the 31st of October under any circumstances. The union of the political parties in July last has been proved to be nothing but an iniquitous and shameful trick, by means of which certain politicians forced themselves into positions of trust and responsibility utterly beyond their capabilities. They never would have done this with the voice of the people. They have, by their greed and incompetence, brought the Royal Newfoundland Regiment to the verge of extinction, and the country to the brink of bankruptcy. The people will demand, through His Excellency the Governor, that they be permitted to hold office longer than next October.

The story about the good revenue is all moonshine. We will want ten revenues like the present to make two ends meet. The waste and extravagance which have been going on the past six months in the various Departments of the Government, have become notorious. Then there is our war expenditure which must now amount to close on five millions. The present tax levied over the year, introduced without delay. They are making huge profits out of this country. Their dividends go to swell the income of some outside shareholder! Their volume of business is increasing year after year. They do not consider our local material, such as brick and granite, good enough, but imported every ounce of it from abroad. The interest which they pay on deposits is the same as that paid a quarter of a century ago. The people therefore have every reason to expect that the Government will increase the war tax upon the banks and thus compel them to more evenly bear their equal share of the burden of the war.

The Herald announces that Mr. John R. Goodison, late Speaker of the Assembly, has been appointed to the position of Purchasing Agent for the Government, having resigned the latter position as a result of his resignation from the Legislature. Most people, and many of Mr. Goodison's constituents, thought when he accepted the position of Purchasing Agent that he was resigning his seat. It will be news for them to find that this is not so. The Herald editor's statement that Mr. Goodison's resignation was influenced by the Imperial exigencies of the moment is mere camouflage, an art in which he tries to excel. It will now be hard for Mr. Goodison to resume his seat, and it appears that he is only now coming to the most amusing part of the farce put on by Sir Edward Morris last year when he resigned his seat. The able letter of "Vigilance" in Tuesday's Herald fully covers this, and the illegal liberties were put an end to by His Excellency the Governor.

It is rumored about town that Hon. P. T. McGrath will shortly resign his position as Editor of the Herald and accept a salary of \$3,000 a year as Chairman of the Board of Pensions.
