

Lecture by Mr. Francis R. Jones F.R.G.S.

The Daughters of the Empire were present in large numbers yesterday afternoon at the King George V. Institute to hear an address by Mr. Francis R. Jones F.R.G.S. the Special Commissioner representing the Overseas Club and Patriotic League, who is paying a special visit to Newfoundland. For the past two years Mr. Jones has been the acting secretary of this great organization in London, and is now on this side of the Atlantic on a special mission to Canada and the United States, which countries he visited in 1915-16, and on this tour has been able to include Newfoundland in his imperary. Mr. Jones addressed the Board of Trade to-day at 1 o'clock, a luncheon having been arranged at Wood's

Restautrant At yesterday afternoon's meeting the chair was occupied by the Hon. W. B. Grieve, who is a life member of the Overseas Club. Supporting the chairman was Miss Annie Hayward, President of the Daughters of the Empire, by whom the arrangements 'were made. Mr. Jones, in the course of his address, greatly interested his hearers in the story of the Overseas Club. He traced its origin from the day when the idea was first mentioned by the late Cecil Rhodes right down through its nine years of active work, and pointed out that while it had done much war work, it was not a war-time organization. Dwelling on the power of sentiment he said the Overseas Club was built on that idea, for the purpose of drawing closer together in the bonds of comradeship all the peoples of the Empire and British people living in foreign countries. He quoted its creed: "Believing the British Empire to stand for freedom, justice, order and good government, we pledge ourselves as citizens of the British Commonwealth of Free Nations to maintain the heritage handed down to us by our fathers." Mr. Jones paid a great tribute to the Overseas Dominions and their glorious response to the call of sentimentto their loving offer of help to the Mother Country, and particularly emphasized the devotion and loyalty of Newfoundland. In moving tearms he testified to the sacrifices made by the nen of the Overseas Dominions, an
