Lansings Resignation Taken Seriously in London -- Italian Transport Captured -- "Flu" Epidemic Subsiding -- U. S. Senate and the Peace Treaty.

DISCUSSING METHODS OF TAXATION.

LONDON, Feb. 16. In the Commons to-night on the Government's motion for the appointment of a committee to inquire into the practicability of a tax on war increases in wealth, Sir Donald Maclean, Liberal, moved an amendment in favor of extending the inquiry into the practicability of a capital levy to reduce the national debt. J. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, opposed the amendment on the ground that the prospect of such a levy would encourage extravagant spending, check enterprise and discourage saving. He said he believed Great Britain would be able to meet her liabilities without resorting to dangerous or other experiments. The motion was defeated.

ITALIAN TRANSPORT CAPTURED BY INSURGENTS.

FLORENCE, Feb. 16. Two war vessels attached to the

forces of Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio have captured an Italian transport having on board one thousand regular troops, in the Gulf of Quertis, southwest of this city.

AND PROBABLY MANY OTHER THINGS.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 16. Danish importers have decided to discontinue all importations of American cattle fodder because of the extremely high rate of exchange. It was stated to-day in business circles.

LONDON PAPERS TAKE SERIOUS VIEW LANSING'S RESIGNATION.

LONDON, Feb. 16. The resignation of Secretary of State Lansing is given great prominence in the morning papers, and in view of the circumstances is treated as a first-class sensation. Most of the papers editorially express the fear that the incident will have an adverse effect on the progress of America's influence in world affairs.

STEAMER ADRIATIC IN GALE.

BOSTON, Feb. 16. The United States Shipping Board steamer Adriatic, which was reported disabled and adrift in a heavy gale about a thousand miles east of New York shortly after midnight, expected assistance to-day from the steamship Elmsport, also a Shipping Board vessel, according to a radio message intercepted here. Captain Gott of the crippled steamer said the tubes in all three boilers had blown out and the vessel would have to be towed to Halifax for repairs. The Red Mountain was bound from Galveston to Havre.

READING NOT FOR U.S.A.

LONDON, Feb. 16. Reports that Earl Reading would resign as Lord Chief Justice and accept the position of British Ambassador at Washington, are not justified, according to a statement made by the Earl's Secretary to the Star this morning.

"FLU" EPIDEMIC SUBSIDING.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16. Epidemics of Spanish Influenza throughout Canada are rapidly subsiding, according to the Federal Health Authorities. While the outbreak in some centres has been fairly sharp, it has not been nearly so bad as last year.

RESERVED JUDGMENT.

LONDON, Feb. 16. The Privy Council to-day reserved judgment on the appeal concerning the collision of the steamships Ima and Mont Blanc which caused the Halifax explosion. The appeal involves liabilities of ten millions.

MUST DECIDE FOR THEMSELVES.

LONDON, Feb. 16. Bonar Law, Government spokesman, said in the House to-day that Great Britain had informed the Baltic States, Finland and Poland, that the question of peace or war with Soviet Russia was one they must decide on their own responsibility. Great Britain taking no responsibility in the matter.

PARIS PAPER SAYS WILSON TURNED DOWN.

PARIS, Feb. 16. Prompt rejection of President Wilson's objections to the compromise agreement by which England, France and Italy hoped to settle with Jugo Slavia the questions relative to the Adriatic is reported in the Echo de Paris. Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain, and Millerand of France, drafted a reply to the American Chief Executive and insisted that Jugo Slavia must agree to a compromise with the alternative of seeing the Treaty of London become operative, it is said.

WILSON'S NOTE NOT ULTIMATUM.

PARIS, Feb. 16. President Wilson's note on the Adriatic question is not considered in French circles as an ultimatum, it was declared to-day, by a Foreign Office Official. On such partial information as was obtainable yesterday, the Paris Press construed the note as meaning that France and Great Britain must change their attitude on that question or the United States would withdraw from all connection with European affairs.

PREPARING EX-KAISER'S FUTURE HOME?

CALGARY, Alta., Feb. 16. On his way to the Dutch East Indies, ostensibly to become a planter but in reality, it is believed, to prepare a future home there for the ex-Kaiser, Count Uffiaask Kraten, of the Dutch diplomatic service, and nephew of Count Bentinck, the Kaiser's present host in Holland, passed through the city last evening on his way west.

THE DEBATE AGAIN BEGINS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16. Consideration of the Peace Treaty was resumed in the open Senate to-day by unanimous consent. Without debate the Senate acceded to the request of Senator Lodge, Republican leader, that the Treaty be taken up. To start the parliamentary machinery toward a possible compromise, Senator Lodge moved the adoption of a
