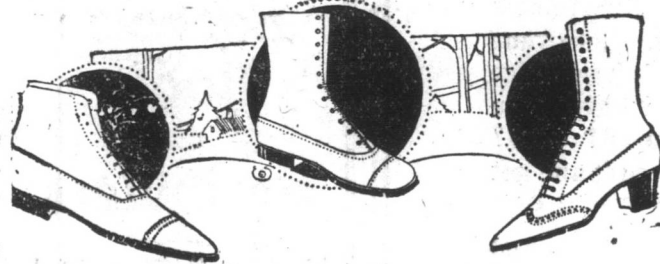

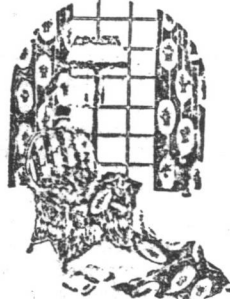

Recently a New York Supreme Court justice granted an injunction to prevent Mayor Hyman from barring the representative of one newspaper from the meetings of a city board. In doing so, the judge said: "The press is the lever that moves the world as no other earthly power could move it." In commenting on this decision, the Jacksonville Metropolis says: "The public is entitled to know the news. No other agency other than the newspapers can serve them in this respect. Reporters are not seeking facts for the satisfaction of personal curiosity. It is their duty to gather the news regard less of whom it affects, and when a stumbling block is thrown in their way it is an attempt to thwart the rights of the public."
