#### A Tribute.

MISS KATHERINE PRETORIA  
CROKE, A.A., A.T.C.L.

Death in its visitation is no respecter of age; now it is one whose hair has been whitened by the snows of many winters that it claims, again, it seeks the babe who has just taken up the threads of life. And at times as it wearies with culling the bearded grain and the opening bud, it seeks for the perfect bloom and bears it away to the Gardens of God. With such a burden did the death Angel speed on Wednesday morning, July 5, when it entered the country home of Mr. James Croke, Railroad Inspector, Reid Newfoundland Co., and bore away from suffering and pain to bliss and life eternal the soul of his fourth daughter, Katherine Pretoria (Kitty). The deceased young lady was born in Fiacente on June 5, 1900, a day made memorable in the history of the British Empire by the victory at Pretoria over the Boers. While still young she came with her family to St. John's, and resided at No. 12 Allan's Square.

A pupil of the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, Kitty was beloved by teachers and class-mates; she endeared herself to all by her gentle winning ways, her amiability, her earnestness of character and her love of fun. Kitty was always an earnest student and at the time of her graduation she had the unique honor of wearing the double wreath of Associate in Arts, (A.A., C.H.E.) and Associate of Trinity College of Music, London (A.T.C.L.). For some time she taught music successfully, her pupils gaining high places in the Trinity College Exams. A year ago her health began to fail and it soon became evident that despite the best medical attendance and the tenderest care the disease was "unto death." A few months ago she entered the Sanatorium, but as she did not improve there she was removed to her country home where she was waited on lovingly and perseveringly by her devoted mother. On Tuesday the last change set in—Rev. Father Rawlins attended her and administered all the rites of Holy Church and spoke words of encouragement and help to the soul going out to meet its Maker and on Wednesday morning at 5.30 full of faith, resignation and trust, she passed away, unspooled and unsolled by the world. To her sorrowing parents—Mr. and Mrs. James Croke and to her loving sisters—St. M. Loretto, of the Presentation Convent, Harbor Grace, May, book-keeper with Messrs. Wood & Kelly, Olive, stenographer with W. R. Howley, Esq., K.C., and Myrris, her affectionate little chum, we offer our sincerest sympathy in this hour of heartbreaking bereavement.

Where, O death, is thy victory here? Thou hast none; rather has she triumphed over thee, for now she is in possession of that glorious, that everlasting, that true life over which thou hast no dominion. O earth, rest lightly on her remains, for to-day thou dost receive into thy bosom as pure and holy, as noble and genuine a heart as ever beat in human breast. ### Belgium's Canine Heroes

ONLY SIX NOW ALIVE.

GHENT, Belgium.—Only six of Belgium's "War Heroes" remain. They are not human heroes, but brilliantly intelligent and daring dogs who distinguished themselves for valor and fidelity on the field of battle. Originally there were 18, but ten proved that even dogs can be martyrs. Three were killed in action at the front, three died of wounds, two were poisoned by the Germans, one died of grief over the loss of his soldier-master, and one was mercifully put out of his misery when the enemy came to seize him. The six survivors were proudly exhibited by their owners at the Palais des Fetes recently. Some have gallant ads of peace to their credit as well as honors of war. They have saved children from drowning, stopped runaway horses, caught burglars, protected sheep and stood silent guard over their masters' lives and homes. Three of them have the Cross of War for heroism and devotion in the field.
