### Peers vs. People.

Fortunately for the peace of Parliament, to say nothing of the popularity of the Peers, the two Houses of the British Legislature rarely come into conflict, and when they do disagree the most popular in the end prevails. In this case, there was something like a political tug of war between the representatives of the Peers and those of the people, and the latter then won. On August 17, the public were informed in the morning papers that the Irish Land Bill had passed its third reading in the House of Commons, the second reading had taken place a fortnight earlier, after two days' debate without a division the Marquis of Salisbury, as leader of the Opposition, advising his followers to support the Bill in Committee. This was a tactical move, for the result of the amendments were in-undecided and carried by large majorities in the Upper House, and they were the essential character of the Bill. Mr. W. E. Gladstone—then Prime Minister—backed by the whole of the Liberal Party, protested that if these amendments were allowed, the whole object of the Bill would be frustrated. The result was that after a few acceptances of minor amendments the Bill was sent back to the Lords with all vital amendments retained, and the original clauses reinstated. Then it looked as if grave constitutional complications were about to take place, and great meetings were held all over the country protesting against the action of the Peers, and it certainly seemed as if the differences between the two Houses of Legislature were irreconcilable. At last the representative of the great Cecil family "climbed down," and at the eleventh hour all opposition to the Bill was removed, and the political horizon soon became clearer. The crisis having been averted, thus on August 16, when the Bill with its final revisions was sent up from the Commons, Lord Salisbury recommended the Peers to accept it. But at the same time, he said, if the Duke of Devonshire had not moved the amendment which the Commons had rejected—those to move their re-consideration would again support them. As it happened the Duke was absent, and the Marquis realizing that even in the case of a Peer, prudence may be the better part of valour—preserved a discreet silence. The political situation was saved—and the People's House secured a notable victory over their leg-

islative brethren in the Patrician Chamber.

### Obituary.

#### MRS. ALICE WHITEWAY.

On Saturday morning, 12th. inst., there entered into rest Mrs. Alice Whiteaway, relict of the late Henry Whiteaway, at the age of 61 years. She had been in failing health for some time, but during the last six months she gradually weakened, and death followed a stroke of paralysis, bringing a happy issue to her sufferings, and her spirit into that land from whence no traveller ever returns. Her many friends will learn with regret, that the earthly link which bound them together here has been severed. In the home circle the magnet is gone—there will the loss be felt very keenly. She was sustained by the comforting presence of her children, who did all possible to alleviate her sufferings until the end came. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, and was largely attended, the coffin being covered with beautiful flowers. Rev. W. H. Browning conducted the services at the church and graveside, when all that was mortal was laid to rest in the Methodist Cemetery. Mrs. Whiteaway is survived by five children, one daughter, Mrs. J. C. Dinwoodie of Connecticut, U.S.A. by a former marriage; and by the latter, three daughters, Mildred of St. John's, Mary and Annie at home; one son, Mr. Edwin Whiteaway, Assistant with Dr. W. S. Goodwin; one sister, Mrs. Eliza Fitzgerald residing in Massachusetts, U.S.A.; Mrs. J. H. Peet of St. John's is a niece. To the sorrowing family the writer offers deepest sympathy. And in the words of the poet, may their grief be assigned by the comforting thought, that—  
"There is no death  
What seems so is transition;  
This life of mortal breath  
Is but a suburb of the life elysian,  
Whose portal we call death."

## In the Realms of Sport.

### LAST NIGHT'S FOOTBALL.

B.I.S. 6 Goals; C.E.I. Nil.

The B.I.S. and C.E.I. footballers turned out a fair attendance of fans to witness the game at St. George's Field last evening, which, did not prove to be up to expectations. The Irish lads won by an overwhelming score of 6 goals to nil, in a game that was marked by poor play of the Institute lads while it suited the B. I. S. to a nicety, and was a splendid work-out for their approaching match with the Saints, which depends so much on the championship. Referee Hunt called the players to the gridiron sharp on time, but the C.E.I. were minus three players, the gaps were filled up by two spectators, while Ern Churchill's place was left open until his arrival, which arrangement was unavoidable. In the first half the Irishmen had matters all their own way and commenced by pressing hard from the outset, which during the period netted them four goals, Harry Phelan who played to good form was responsible for three, while Eddie Phelan scored one. The Institute lads were never dangerous, though on one occasion Churchill took control of the ball at a lively clip down the field, but was repulsed from in front of the Irish goal just as he was about to shoot.

### THE SECOND PERIOD

proved to be much better. The C. E. I. boys appeared to be coming to life, and with the help of Billy Dwyer, who was playing a rattling good game, the Institute lads kept the speedy Irish forwards at bay. It was not until twenty minutes after play that Walter Callahan availed of an opportunity and sent a stinging shot from the twenty yard line. Noseworthy partly stopped the ball but it rolled in the net behind him. The B. I. S. kept up the onslaught but found Noseworthy equal to the occasion, while Harold Knight who was playing his first match of the season in the full back line, time and again drove the ball out of danger. Play for a while was confined to midfield; very rarely, though, did the C.E.I. forwards get the ball up the field, as Power and Constantine, with Higgins at centre-half, always appeared to be in the right place at the proper time, and

although their end was visited on one or two occasions, the attempts on goal were very weak. Eddie Phelan, by a pretty shot from the right, beat Noseworthy cold for the final goal of the evening. Darkness now set in, and for a time the ball was hard to locate. The all-over sounded a few minutes later, leaving the B.I.S. victors by a score of 6 goals to nil.

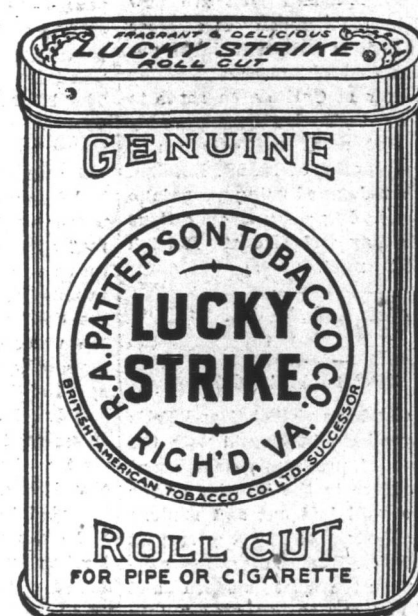
A further practice of the city team will take place on St. George's Field on Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The city line-up will be picked by the executive the same evening.

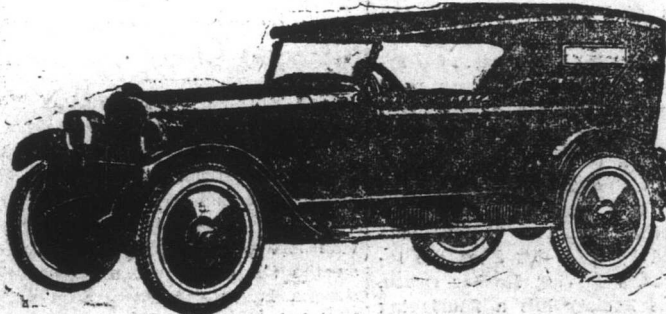

### Obituary.

#### ALEXANDER JAMIESON.

With the first breaking of dawn on the morning of August 16th, the soul of Alexander Jamieson, returned, to its maker. For some months past, he knew the end was not far off, and with a calmness born with a life of true Christianity he prepared for the inevitable. All his ten children were with him before he passed away, and surrounded by loving care on every hand, his soul passed to its maker, while he slept as quietly as a tired child. He had reached the age of seventy-two years, having been born in Peterhead, Scotland in 1850, and came to this country some thirty-five years ago in connection with the herring industry. He resided for a number of years at Hr. Grace, and later in Sound Island, Placentia Bay. Coming to St. John's some fifteen years ago, he became Master Cooper with Bishop Sons & Co., Ltd., which position he held up to a few months before his death, when ill health rendered it necessary for him to rest. Since leaving work he gradually became weaker, until the end came yesterday morning. He leaves behind him to mourn, his wife, six daughters, and four sons, all of whom, with the exception of two daughters at Sound Island, reside in the city. The funeral takes place tomorrow, Friday, at 2.30 p.m., in the General Protestant Cemetery.
