The Chinese Go on Strike.

In opposition to the Paris decision on Shantung, the students of Peking "started something." For the first time in thousands of years they organized and effectively asserted Chinese public opinion. The merchants and students of North China met during the second half of May, declaring a general boycott of Japanese goods, and demanding the dismissal of the three "traitors," Tsao Ju-lin, Lu Tsung-yu and Chang Chung-hsiang, the notorious agents in the China-Japanese negotiations. The popular sense of equity, which in China asserts itself naturally in strikes, responded everywhere. Unless the Government dismissed the three offenders, merchants would close their shops. Teachers, students, shopkeepers, chauffeurs, dock hands, all classes of workmen would strike. All China, indeed, would go on strike.

The Chinese showed their ability to organize quickly. From ten thousand students striking in Shanghai, the movement spread to the merchants and chambers of commerce. Even associations of servants were formed, under such names as "Industrial National Salvation Society." In Peking, fifty groups of student speakers were sent out to appeal to the public. Martial law was proclaimed, and students trying to speak were arrested. The government soon saw that, though it could imprison them, it could not stem the tide of feeling they were creating.

The government, weakening offered to release the students if they would return to work and make no further trouble. The students, seeing their advantage, stated that they had no wish to leave their prisons, if doing so meant promising to abstain from expressing their opinions; and that, in any case, they would not leave until the government had apologized for their unjust arrest.

The jelling of so many of the youth of China finally brought such ill-concealed opposition that the government complied with the students' ultimatum. An apology was offered them, and the students returned to their colleges and their work. But they continued their street lectures. In Shanghai the boycott and the strike of the shopkeepers were in full force. Their shops were closed; they threatened to pay no taxes unless the "traitors" were ousted.

Even the mafios (horse boys) at the Shanghai Race Club were on strike. A run on the Bank of Communications was started. Tsao Ju-lin was associated with it. More and more serious grew the situation, but the demand on the government was steadfast: "When the three traitors are dismissed, the strike will be called off; otherwise, still more people will strike."

The government finally yielded on June 11. The insistent demand had come from all parts of China that the three unpopular officials go in disgrace. The Peking government complied.—Asia Magazine.

Exchange of Professors.

PRODUCTIVE OF GOOD RESULTS.

EDMONTON, Alta.—Favorable results have followed the exchange of professors which was instituted two years ago by the universities of Western Canada following the visits of professors between the universities of Manitoba and North Dakota. University authorities are elated over the success of the new system which brings Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta universities in closer touch. Arrangements have been completed for an exchange during this winter. The visiting professors remain in Edmonton for three days during which time they give a public address to the students of the university, the staff and all members of the general public who care to attend. This occasion is treated as a formal academic event at which members of the faculty are present in academic costumes. The visiting professor meets the staff of the university on another occasion and also visits the class rooms and laboratories, and meets the students of the particular university department with which he is intimately related in his own university.

Bifocal Eyeglasses Should be Cheaper.

BUFFALO.—The price of eyeglasses, especially of the bifocal type, will be materially lower next year, it is asserted by Dr. D. E. Sharp, an ex-

clusive of one of the largest concerns in America engaged in the manufacture of magnifying glass. Patents which now cover this type of eyeglass will expire and with the resulting competition among manufacturers and the elimination of royalties, material reductions come, he said.
