

Where Germany Keeps Her Millions.

Arthur Mills, who has just returned to England from a tour of the South American republic writes of the trip:

In South America the Germans are everywhere. You will see them in the hotel in Buenos Aires, where they have their suites. Later they are at the Armenoville, the fashionable dance club. They drink champagne till a dull flush tinges the cheeks on their cheeks, and they are laughing.

It is funny from their point of view, all this fuss in Europe about reparations. France putting back by brick the house on her damaged lands and expecting Germany to help. France beating drums and blowing bugles up and down the Rhine and saying: "If you won't pay reparations, we will make you!" when all the time, everybody knows, the money is not in Germany at all—it is in South America.

Business men in that country say that it was in 1918 Germany first started to transfer her capital to South America, when she already saw that she had lost the war. Two years later, when questions about war reparations became awkward, she transferred a great deal more.

To-day, at a rough estimate, the Germans have \$250,000,000 in Buenos Aires, \$145,000,000 in Chile, and large amounts distributed among the other Republics.

It is all very cunningly done. For example, in Buenos Aires the Germans have only 12 companies registered under their own names—an insignificant number compared with the 100 registered British companies. To locate German capital one has to search deeper than registered lists.

The Germans have converted their companies into Argentine concerns; the same counts for little; the money goes the same way. The shipping in Buenos Aires has to be as rich in value of merchandise as any in the world. A few weeks ago the Germans had a second flag in the port.

Stinnes a Power. Think what this means. For four or a half years, by fair means and foul, Germany endeavored to cripple the merchant service of Great Britain. In punishment she was ordered to surrender all her own shipping except what was necessary for immediate needs. Three years ago she was lying off the wharves of Buenos Aires the second most powerful merchant fleet of any country. Stinnes's name is a power in Argentina. Stories of German prosperity echo from all sides. No more important firm exists in Buenos Aires than the Argentine Iron and Steel Company, who have supplied half the building material of the city. Their power in 1922 exceeded \$12,000,000. This huge old-established concern has freely that it now has a serious competitor to face. Two years ago Herr Thyssen, of the Ruhr, started a rival company. To-day "Thyssen" building boards may be seen all over Buenos Aires.

In Chile I heard the same tale with regard to the nitrate industry of the country.

Before leaving Argentina, I took a drive through Belgrano, the German colony outside Buenos Aires. The Germans are building themselves palaces in Belgrano which an Argentine millionaire might envy.

As I looked on these great buildings, rising stone upon stone, my mind went back to a little village on the Argentine coast in September, 1914, where, amid the smoldering ruins of their abandoned home, an old French peasant and his wife lay dead.
