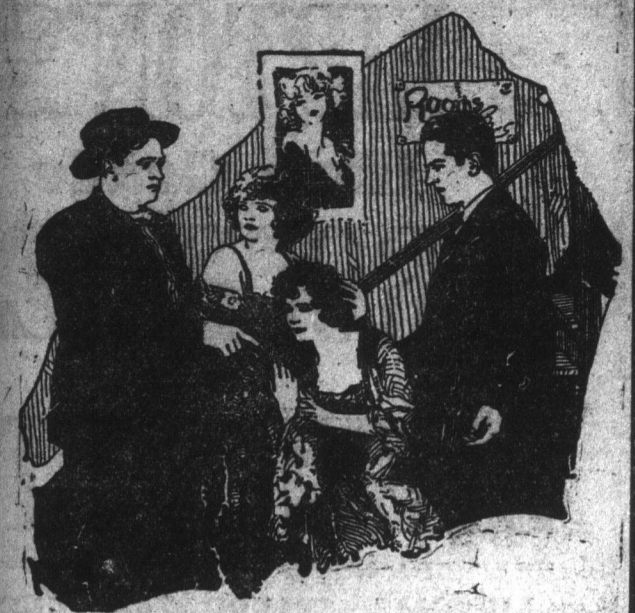

Produce and Provisions

(Trade Review)

Fish—The outlook for the cod fishery this year is very hopeful and the Shore fishery is showing well and very good catches are being reported each week from northern and western sections, both for hook and line. The amount of fish left over is small and is being rapidly disposed of, but there is some fish to be shipped of the catch of Fall and new bank fish caught in the early Spring is being marketed in the West Indies and the other fish is being shipped to Brazil or to the rest. are continually received that supplies are coming forward from Norway and Iceland at reduced prices. It is impossible to give any opinion at present regarding values here, but the general opinion is that it will be considerably less than last year.

Flour—There is still a good deal of activity evident in the flour market which has a strong tone and gives promise of even a firmer aspect in the future. The market showed an advance in price last week and ever since that time it has taken another upward curve, the price having advanced in the mills abroad by 65 cents the barrel. The supplying trade of the spring has accounted for most of the flour which was on the hands of dealers and the stocks held here now are very slim, we learn. It is estimated by the authorities in the United States on the subject that a winter wheat crop will be over 100,000,000 bushels short of last year and all things considered the future outlook is for higher prices, at least for the next two or three months. The imports for the week were 250 bbls. by S.S. Sable I. from Halifax and the local wholesale prices are from \$5.90 to \$6.95 and \$7.30 per bbl., according to grade.

Pork—Business in pork still continues pretty good, the demand for the week being up to the normal for the season and some fairly large sales were effected. Prices, as far as can be learned of late, have been steadily declining for some time past and have now reached about the bottom, so that it is not unlikely that the next change in this market will be upwards. For this season up-to-date pork in the packing cases has been much lower than last year, with a corresponding cheapness in the prices quoted here. Last week we stated that the idea was entertained that heavy European purchasing of pork would soon materialize and now there is more tangible evidence of this so that prices must soon stiffen up again. Owing to the pressure on the market of the business evident to the supplying season the pork holding here now are not large and future consignments will no doubt be of considerable volume. The imports this week were 100 bbls. by S.S. Sable I. from Halifax. The quotations on pork in the local market, wholesale, are Fat Back \$24.00 per bbl., as well as S.C. Clear and Regular Plate, Bacon Pork \$24.00, Ham Butt \$24.50, and Spare Ribs \$23.00.

Sugar—Though it was the opinion of most people in the trade last week that sugar had reached the bottom mark as far as the prices were concerned, and though as a matter of fact an advance on 10 points had been recorded, it came more or less of a surprise to all during the week just closed to find that a big drop in prices had taken place. Refiners, as far as we can learn, are of opinion that prices must recover as they are now below cost in Cuba, but it is difficult to say, at least at this writing, when such might occur. The sugar crops of the world are only now regaining their pre-war strength after years of subsidence. It is a fact that this year marks the ninth year in which the world's production of sugar has been below the pre-war need and with the great consumption in the United States and the universal natural increase during a ten year period, it must indeed be a large crop of sugar which would not now be quickly absorbed, and the best that can be hoped for is an approximation this year to the returns of 1913-14 so that prices will not likely drop to the low point that it was at first expected they would. Only one or two small consignments were received during the week and wholesale prices quoted here for granulated are \$7.75 by the bbl. and sack, and brown in 100 lb. sacks, \$7.40.

Miscellaneous—Among the miscellaneous imports during the week were 4,000 tons salt (per S.S. Ursula Semirs), 4,350 tons of coal, 5 cwt. butter, 170 sacks potatoes, 25 packages cheese, 75 sacks peas, 120 sacks beans, 25 cases of canned goods, 62 packages cocoa, 50 packages fruit and vegetables, 20 bbls. tar, 30 boxes of soap and by the Sable I., 20 head of horned cattle.

A Fortune in Fleas

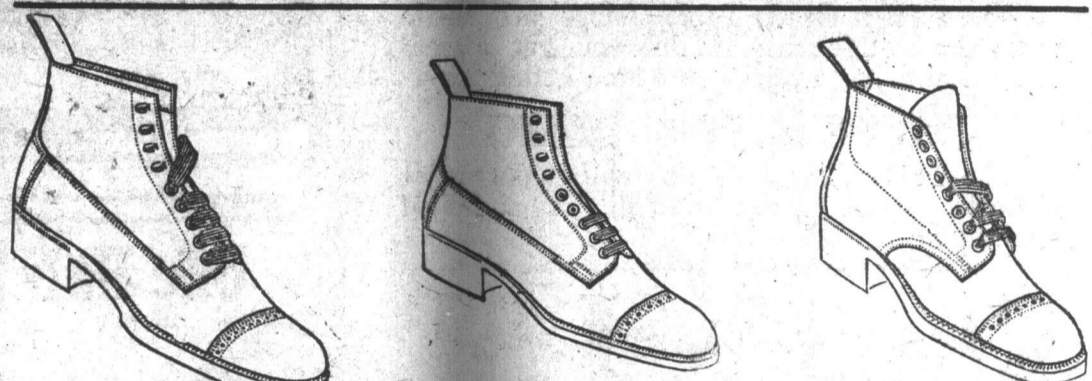
C. L. B. Cadets



Yesterday the 1st N.R. Regiment C.L.B. Cadets, with their Old Comrades, Bishop Spencer and Girl Friendly Society Girl Guides and Ranger Companies, paraded at 2.15 p.m. and marched to the Church of England Cathedral for Divine Service. They were under command of Lt.-Col. Walter F. Rendell, C.B.E., and Captain Stick, Adjutant. Four hundred and thirty all ranks mustered. The Regimental Band, under Captain Morris and Bugle Band under Sergeant Sidney Burgess were in excellent form and provided martial music. The Colours were in charge of Lieut. Eric Jarrist. Full size decorations were worn by all ranks. Sergeant Major T. Ricketts, V.C., also paraded with Field College Company. The usual Brigade service was held in the Cathedral. The service was choral, Mr. King presiding at the organ which was very much appreciated. The Brigade was courteously received and seated by Mr. Frank E. Rendell, Peppier's Warden. The clergyman present were, Rev. Canon Jeeves, M.A., Rector, Rev. and Captain Herbert Pike and Rev. J. Brinton, Battalion Chaplain. Rev. E. M. Bishop, Rector of Bay Roberts, Company Chaplain of H. Company, was also present in the pews. The sermon was preached by Rev. Canon Jeeves from the text 4th Chapter, 2nd verse of Exodus. The address was short, practical and to the point. He thanked the Old Comrades for their loyal support and presence, and extended a hearty welcome to the Girl Guides at all C.L.B. Church parades. He announced that the annual C.L.B.
