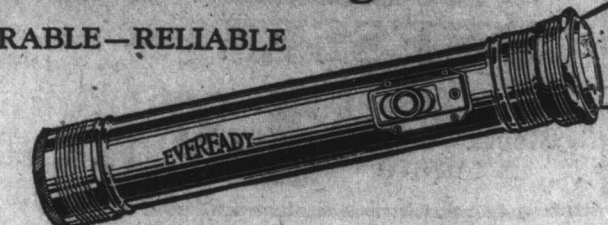
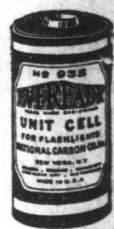

RESUMING NEGOTIATIONS WITH RUSSIA.

LONDON, May 27.—The British Minister Chamberlain, answering questions today in the House of Commons, declared that the British Government had no intention of resuming negotiations with Russia.

BLANK IN U.S. PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IMMINENT.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 27.—A serious break in the Presbyterian Church in the United States is imminent, according to the denomination's annual assembly in session here, declared today.

BARBER'S FAITH IN AMUNDSEN

COPENHAGEN, May 27.—The Danish Minister of Marine, Knud Rasmussen, explorer, just back from Canada, where he was in connection with the Dominion Government regarding plans now under way for extending the influence of civilization to the Canadian northland, expressed the following opinions today on Amundsen's fate: "Nobody is able to say anything positive on the matter. I still hope for the best and even if Amundsen is unable to carry through his plans many possibilities are there. There is a possibility of him going to Fort Conger or Cape Columbia, which case nothing would be heard of him until the first mail from the north about this time next year. If he is heard by then, he is not necessarily lost. He may have sought shelter in Greenland, North Scandinavia, Denmark or other places in the East Greenland Company's territory and in that case we will hear from him until the autumn of 1926. I have absolute confidence in Amundsen."

DONOGHUE'S SIXTH DERBY.

EPSON, May 27.—Manna, by Phalaris out of Waffles, trained by H. E. Morris, won the Derby today with Steve Donoghue, star jockey, riding to his sixth Derby victory. Manna finished eight lengths ahead of 26 runners. Donoghue pushed Manna ahead at the start, held the lead and was pulling up the finish line when his opponents were using whip and heels in a final second effort. Agha Khan's Zlonist came second and two lengths farther back came Sirdar, owned by the American, McComer. Lord Astor's Cross was the favorite; Lord Derby's Contender, second favorite, and the third entry, Ptolemy II, Runnymede.

STERLING NEARLY PAR.

LONDON, May 27.—Renewed demand for sterling exchange today caused the cable transfer rate on New York to touch 4.86 7/16, the highest since the war.

EARTHQUAKE CASUALTIES.

TOKIO, May 27.—The latest estimates of casualties from the earthquake which shook Tajima District, northwest of Osaka, Saturday last, place the number of dead at 245 and the injured at 482. Throughout the district 3518 houses collapsed or were burnt.

THOUSANDS VIEW HANGINGS.

SOPIA, May 27.—Three leaders in the recent bombing of Sveti Kral Cathedral, in which 160 persons were killed, were hanged here today. The men executed were Zagosky, custodian of the cathedral,

Friedman and Koeff. The men were hanged in the public square just behind the Jewish cemetery. Troops formed lines around the execution place and thousands witnessed the hangings. Three more have been sentenced to death for connection with the cathedral plot.

TO SCRAP 200 SHIPS.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The Shipping Board voted today to offer for sale 200 ships for scrapping. A number of bids are expected, among them probably one from Henry Ford.

FIFTY MINERS TRAPPED.

RALEIGH, N.C., May 27.—About fifty men were reported trapped in a mine of the Carolina Coal Co., eight miles from Sanford, N.C., when an explosion occurred shortly before midday. Officials of the mine stated one body had been recovered and more than half a hundred were at work in the lower levels when the explosion occurred.

MOTOR SHIP ABLAZE.

SEATTLE, Wn., May 27.—The motor ship Wakana was ablaze from stem to stern early today, in the Pacific Ocean, off British Columbia. The fate of the crew was not learned.

EGYPTIAN TRIALS CLOSED.

CAIRO, May 27.—Evidence was closed today in the trial of nine men accused of murdering Sir Lee Oliver Stack, Sirdar of the Egyptian Army, but summing up was not completed today.

TO LEAD CONSERVATIVES.

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 27.—Dr. J. M. Baxter, K.C., member of the House of Commons, was selected today to lead the Conservative Party of New Brunswick in the impending general provincial elections. In his speech of acceptance, Dr. Baxter charged the present Government with extravagance and gave warning to all contractors that if returned to power he would cancel any contracts given by the present Government for the Grand Falls power development, if apparent that such contracts were given for election purposes.

Avoid Such Tragedies by Some Precautions

Editor Evening Telegram
Dear Sir—Would you grant me a little space in your Evening Telegram to give the cause of the regrettable accident that occurred on Pleasant Street on Friday evening, May 22nd, when Marie Simms, a bright little girl of 5-1-2 years, lost her life, and ask the Municipal Council and the Inspector General of Police if they are going to allow the conditions to continue under which this accident occurred. I claim, if the upper portion of the street had been attended to by the motor sprinkler as much as the lower portion, i.e. between the entry of the Street from New Gower Street and Springdale Street, the accident would not have happened. The child came out of her home to buy candy at Mr. Bert Vavasour's store, nearly opposite her home. Getting her candy she came on the sidewalk. A motor car was going up the street at a good clip, which raised a cloud of dust. She waited until the car passed; the dust raised by this car and the clouds of dust driving down with the gale of westerly wind, prevented her from seeing the motor car coming down the street. She made the run for her home, and was hurled into Eternity some three minutes after she had left her home. Mr. Editor, there are quite a number of other children living on Pleasant Street. Given the same conditions as obtained on Friday last, well then, they cannot escape accidents of this nature. I would suggest that narrow streets, such as Pleasant Street, be made "one way" streets for motor traffic. Why, Mr. Editor, there are very few motor cars, but Fords, that can be turned on Pleasant Street, without going to the cross openings to do so. Thanking you for space, Mr. Editor, I remain,
