

Vatican Borrows Million and Half From U.S. Bankers

ROME, Oct. 25.—An agreement has been reached between the Vatican and Blair & Co., and the Chase National Bank of New York City establishing a \$1,500,000 credit for the Vatican in New York.

Arrangements for the credit were consummated in a letter sent by the papal secretary, Cardinal Gasparri, to the New York banks on October 11, stating that the Vatican was delighted with agreements for credit with Blair & Co., and also especially with the Chase National Bank.

Cardinal Gasparri wrote that the conditions under which the credit was granted, considering the exigencies of the market, were tempered by a sentiment of devotion to the Holy See.

His Eminence Cardinal Hayes of New York has been authorized to sign the agreement on behalf of the Vatican.

The conditions under which the credit was established follow:

1. The amount of the credit shall be one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000), part of which shall always be left on deposit in the Chase National Bank in order to insure continuity of relations between the Holy See and the banks.
2. That part of the credit which is used by the Holy See shall be repaid upon expiration of one year from the date when it is drawn.
3. For credit drawn interest of 4.9 per cent. shall be paid.

Establishment of the credit signifies that the Blair and Chase Banks have become the Vatican depositories of a flattering compliment to American banking.

The Holy See wishes to insure against the vicissitudes of Continental currencies and to facilitate relations with the American hierarchy the growing importance of which is acknowledged by the Vatican.

In a letter confirming the agreement, the Holy See expresses appreciation of the promptness with which negotiations were concluded and pleasure at the satisfactory conditions.

Cardinal Gasparri said the Vatican will be pleased to request through these banks any financial assistance that may be needed in the future.

The agreement was consummated through Commendatore Francesco Giannini, representing the Bank of Italy, and Alfredo Prola, editor of the *Espresso Romano*.

BALLATER—The King and Queen danced for fully two hours at the ball given by their Majesties in Balmoral recently to their ghillies, servants and tenants.

Preceded by the King's piper, Pipe-Major Forsyth, the King and the Queen entered the ballroom accompanied by their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, the Prince and Princess Arthur of Connaught, and the Princess Victoria, Princess Helena, Lord and Lady Maud Carnegie, Lord and Lady Glentanar, the Archbishop of York and Sir J. Douglas Ramsay, the King's Commissioner at Balmoral.

All Old Dances. No modern dances were included in the programme, which consisted of Highland reels, Strathspeys, the Carcassian circle, Spanish gavottes, the Reel of Tulloch, "Eightsoles" and waltzes.

The opening dance was a reel, in which the Queen's partner was Pipe-Major Forsyth. Scarcely a dance did the Queen miss during the stay of the Royal party, and Her Majesty appeared to find much pleasure in them all.

Several old waltz tunes selected by Her Majesty were played by the orchestra. They were "Missouri," "Night of Gladness," and "The Merry Widow." Pipe-Major Forsyth acted as M. C., and amongst those present were the officers and M.C.O.'s of the King's Guard of the Gordon Highlanders at Balmoral.

London Imports Irish Tobacco

LONDON—Irish tobacco is being imported into London in bulk for the first time for a hundred years. The first consignment of fifteen tons left the Port of Dublin a few weeks ago. "It is rather strong to smoke," an official of the Irish Free State in London said, "but its particular beauty can be best savored when it is blended with tobaccos better known commercially."

For the past 30 years Ireland has been doing her best to make her little tobacco industry a success, and the principal seat of it is in County Wexford where a number of acres are planted with the weed. So far the export has been small, but now apparently English buyers are getting interested.

Tiny Jersey Isle

DEFIES EMPIRE'S CLAIM TO TAXES.

(Special to the Toronto Star.)

St. Helier, Island of Jersey, English Channel, Oct. 17.—This tiny island with a total of 45 square miles to-day hurled defiance at the mighty British Empire.

Jersey, lying only a few hours by steamer from the southern coast of England, is one of the few remaining earthly paradises where there is no income tax, where the total taxation is negligible, where whiskey is far cheaper than in Scotland, wine more inexpensive than in France and to-

bacco less costly than in Virginia.

With the arrival to-day of a special committee of the British privy council headed by the Duke of Atholl, Great Britain renewed its efforts to exact a tribute of taxation from the channel islands. Britain asks a contribution of £325,000 annually from

Jersey and £275,000 from Guernsey.

Jersey retorts that Britain has no right to tax her, that she cannot and will not contribute. The privy council committee came to investigate the island's capacity to pay and to attempt to arrange an amicable settlement.

In one ancient city, the explorers discovered the first real astronomical observatory of the old Mayas to be unearthed. Here mounds and pyramids had been constructed in such relative positions that priests could ascend the main mound and, sighting over three mounds in the foreground, make scientific, astronomical calculations. In this way they could tell when eclipses of the sun and moon were due to occur. They used this knowledge to wield power over the Indians.

Charged by Moose

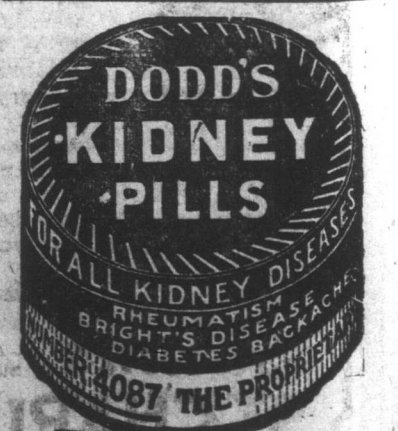
Exciting Experience of Truro Hunter In Woods at Tatamagouche Mountain.

New Process Hardens Lead

What generations of scientists have tried to do since the days of early Egypt and failed, has at last been accomplished. It is reported by the Western Electric Company. A method has been found to harden and temper lead. R. S. Dean and W. E. Hudson, of Chicago metallurgical engineers, discovered the process largely through accident.

A small percentage of alloy is used and the metal is treated by a special heating process that results in a metal three times as hard as ordinary lead. One of the uses for the new metal is heating for telephone cables.
