The Right Hon. Fox Maule, Earl of Dalhousie, whose death was briefly announced a few days ago, was in early life an officer of the 77th Highlanders, and served in Canada for several years on the staff of his uncle, the then Lord Dalhousie. He was son of the late Lord Panmure, and was born in April, 1801. He succeeded to the earldom of Dalhousie in 1860, on the death of his cousin, who was serving at the time as Governor-General of India. He was created a Knight of the Order of the Thistle in 1863, and of the Grand Cross of the Bath in 1867. He took an active part in ecclesiastical affairs, and was a leading member of the Free Church of Scotland. He was for some time Grand Master of the Free Masons of Scotland, a post he resigned in 1870.
