The Fatal Avalanche.

London, Jan. 13.—Dispatches from Serojevo, the capital of Bosnia, state that an avalanche crashed down from the mountains close by Levno, and a number of houses were completely buried and crushed by the immense weight of snow, and their occupants were buried in the ruins of their dwellings. So far the rescuers have succeeded in recovering the bodies of seven persons who were crushed to death. In addition they have removed a number of persons who are seriously injured.

Parnell's Misstatements.

London, Jan. 13.—A dispatch was sent to Mr. Gladstone to-day in regard to Parnell's statement in his Limerick speech, that Mr. McCarthy communicated to the cx-Premier the substance of Parnell's manifesto before it was published. In reply Mr. Gladstone telegraphs as follows: "Mr. Parnell's assertion is untrue. Mr. McCarthy told me that he had a manifesto, but he did not describe its contents."

Mr. McCarthy authorizes a denial of the report that serious difference arose at the Boulogne conference. He says the statement that the McCarthyites demanded O'Brien's unqualified support of their leader and that O'Brien repelled their demand, thus leaving a loophole for Parnell's return, is a pure invention.

THE PILES GAVE WAY.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 13,—Yesterday afternoon shortly after 4 o'clock a terrible accident happened at Ocean Dock at the entrance to the harbor, resulting in the loss accident happened at Ocean Dock at the entrance to the harbor, resulting in the loss of four lives. A gang of men were employed in discharging canned salmon from the steamer Danube, which arrived a few days ago from northern ports. The cases of salmon were being piled in a large shed at the end of the wharf, and about 5,000 cases had been landed and piled up in addition to a quantity already stored in the shed, when suddenly a depression of the flooring was noticed, and with a grinding, crashing noise the piles gave way. Crosh went some of the stringers and the heavy pieces of timber, and the flooring parted, precipitating the men and thousands of cases of salmon into the yawning guli. The names of the killed are Fox (married), Kelly, Tom Higgins and Bestell, all long-shoremen and residents of Victoria. Chasa Carl, a Swede, is badly injured.
