Wholesale Arrest.

County Detectives Raid Wretched Domicile.

Grenwell Brooks and Wife Charged With Keeping a Disorderly House -Other Inmates Arrested.

On Saturday night Detectives Ward and Northgreaves, armed with a warraided the house of Grenwell and Sarah Brooks, on a street running east off Price street, in the sparsely-settled district near Vauxhall bridge, on the county side of Egerton street. The couple, who are man and wife, were charged with keeping a disorderly

house. The house contained four rooms and two beds. Brooks is a peddler, and travels with other peddlers named Ernest Grimshaw and Albert Short. It is alleged by the woman's father, Mr. Dicker, that while Brooks is away, disgraceful scenes are enacted before the small children. At 9 o'clock, when the officers approached the place, sounds of drunken hilarity came from the dirtbegrimed cottage. When they entered everything was quiet. On an old lounge lay Jerry Fitzpatrick, half drunk, and rolled up in an old carpet, in company with his pet dog. The little childrentwo boys and a girl aged about 5-were undisturbed, being evidently used to nocturnal visitors. Their faces were very dirty, and to keep warm they were cuddled behind the stove. They begged

the visitors for money. The constables inquired for Brooks and Grimshaw. Mrs. Brooks, who was attired in her husband's coat and an old skirt, gave them to understand that she "didn't know nothing about where Brooks was, unless Grim and him had gone to the store." Short was found asleep on one of the two beds, and, being roused, made his way into the yard to look after the horses, which were tied to a wagon in the yard. The officers waited until after 10 o'clock for Brooks and Grimshaw, but they failed to return. Short and Fitzpatrick were

handcuffed and taken to jail. Yesterday morning Constables Northgreaves and Ward again went out and arrested Grenwell Brooks, Sarah Brooks and Ernest Grimshaw, who, they say, is the "star boarder." The three children were also brought in, the whole being driven to the London West lockup in one of the prisoners' wagons. SEVERE FIGHT IN THE MAIDAN VALLEY. Simla, Nov. 8.—Various reconnaissances and foraging expeditions from the camp of Sir William Lockhart, in the Maidan valley, yesterday captured large supplies of provisions and forage without opposition until they were retiring, when the insurgent tribesmen adopted their usual guerilla tactics, with the result that the British forces lost three men killed and had seventeen wounded. The loss of the enemy was heavy.

AN AUDIENCE WITH THE POPE. Rome, Nov. 8.—The pope granted a lengthy audience today to the archbishops of St. Louis, the Most Rev, John J. Kain and the Most Rev. Edouard C. Cabre.
