LAI'D DOWN ON THE TRACK.

Deliberate Suicide of a Farmer Whose Mind Was Unhinged by Illness.

WINDSOR, March 10.—Wm. Abbott, a farmer, aged 50 years, was run over and fatally injured by a train on the Lake Erie road, east of Windsor, early yesterday morning. One leg was cut away and his skull was fractured, and without recovering consciousness, the unfortunate man died at 9 o'clock. It seems that Abbott, who lives on a farm near Jericho, had been ill with fever for several days. During the night he must have become delirious, for without arousing the household, he left his bed, removed his shirt, and after donning a pair of drawers and socks he fled across the fields. The engineer of the 6:40 train was startled to see the half-naked man standing on the track some distance ahead. When the whistle was sounded to warn him, instead of getting out of the way, Abbott deliberately lay down on the track and the train passed over him. A halt was made and a physician was summoned, but there was no help for the terribly mangled man. Deceased was a widower with three grown up daughters.

Aside from the general herd law about cattle running at large, chap. 179, given in 189, R. S. O., distinctly states that no horses, sheep, swine or other cattle shall be permitted to be at large upon any highway within half a mile of the intersection of such highway with railway, unless the cattle are in charge of some person or persons to prevent their loitering or stopping on such highway at such intersection.

Interment was at Mount Pleasant.

A Cottage Fire.

Some London firemen felt sure that they had a new church fire to attend at 2:15 Sunday morning as they turned the corner on Askin street and saw smoke issuing apparently from the Sunday school of St. James' Church. But the fire was at 109 Askin street, next door to the Sunday school, in a frame house, the property of Mr. James Robinson, South London, and occupied by a family named Penny. The fire was confined to the kitchen, where it originated from the chimney. The hook and ladder truck and five men went over from the central station and assisted in subduing the flames. The loss on building will be \$250, covered by insurance. Mr. Penny loses all his kitchen furniture.

FIGHTING THE FLAMES.

Destruction of a Universalist Church at Bay City, Mich.—Horses Cremated.

BAY CITY, Mich., March 10.—The First Universalist Church, on the northwest corner of Madison Avenue and Seventh street, was totally destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. Loss \$15,000. While the church was burning there were four offers from other churches to give the use of edifices for services.

St. John's, Que., March 10.—The St. John stone china works of Messrs. B. & A. McDonald were this morning the scene of a fire which but for the unceasing pluck of the firemen and an abundant supply of water might have ended with very serious results. It originated in the flooring around one of the kilns spreading to the ceiling and the packing room, after a stubborn fight of about 30 minutes it was extinguished. The principal loss will be from water.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Fourteen horses were burned to death yesterday morning in a fire which broke out in the stables of the National and Ridgewood Ice Company.

Newfoundland Sealers.

St. John's, Nfld., March 10.—Twenty steamers, two less than last year, sailed yesterday to engage in the seal fishery. They take as their crews 4,000 men.

Distress in Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., March 10.—The banks will not accept any compromise from firms indebted to them, and are winding up business houses all over the city. Five of the largest mercantile houses here were closed yesterday. One house offered to pay 70 cents on the dollar, but the offer was refused. There is great indignation over these proceedings, which entail the shutting out of at least 7,000 more men to join the already great crowd of unfortunate here in the search for bread. The Boston relief contributions are doing immense good.
