Paris, July 15. - The progressing changes in the armament of the German troops in Alsace-Lorraine continue to engage the attention of the Within the last few days a number of the new quick-firing guns for the German field artillery have arrived dispatch from Hammerfest, Norway, Metz and Strasbourg. It is intended the porthernmost town of Europe, on that the whole of the seven artillery regiments of the Fifteenth and Sixeenth Corps of Alsace-Lorraine shall be provided with the new weapons by Aug. 25, so that they may take part in the September maneuvers. The artillery of the Treves and Mainz corps will have their guns by the middle of September. These guns are shorter than which again are shorter than the French 9-centimeter gun.
