How It Will be Ruined and Puffed This Year.

The summer girl is still with us, light and airy in sleeves that resemble balloons as much as ever. And man, to his disgust, has learned once more that a woman does not always mean what she says. The big sleeves crowd him to one side, and secretly he is afraid this is a bad omen of what the new woman is going to do. So all spring he has been rejoicing at the rumor of tight sleeves.

The tight sleeves have come, but who would recognize them. A tight sleeve in all its native simplicity takes away the

brood effect which women have striven so hard to obtain. And after hours of toil with dumb-bells and bicycle and all manner of athletic sports, would any woman wear sleeves that made her look narrow? No, indeed. She puts on those tight sleeves, because Dame Fashion says she must, but she covers them with rows of puffs or ruffles until in size they match those to which she has bidden adieu.

The heavy materials must naturally be made into puffs, but in the lighter materials her heart rebels. Row after row, and ruffle after ruffle may be piled on, until the very breezes of summer are bewitched and play a game of hide and seek through them.

The gown in the picture is of straw colored organdy over green satin. The sleeves finish at the elbow with a row of ruffles. The green yoke is surmounted by a ruche of organdy. The sleeves proper have three ruffles, and an additional two ruffles cross the shoulders and meet in a point at the centre of the bodice. An old-fashioned ribbon sash of the green is tied in the back, and long ends fall to the bottom.

Hints to Tourists.

The wise traveller takes one hand-bag large enough to contain all that she needs on her journey. She does not clutter herself with extra bundles. The hand-bag holds her extra shirt waist and handkerchiefs, her toilet requisites and her nightgown.

The nightdress, which is adapted to travel, differs materially from the one which is worn at home. White is too conspicuous for public wear. Cambric is too easily rumpled. Lace and ribbons have an unpleasant affinity for railroad cinders. Consequently the wise tourist selects soft silk, dark in hue, light in weight and untrammelled save for a cord about the waist.

She who would travel comfortably must have a soft cap to wear in the train or on the boat. A hat with a brim does not permit the wearer to lean her head back on a car and it catches the wind on a boat. A silk cap for the former and a woollen Tam o' Shanter for the latter are excellent investments for the traveller to make.

The traveller who wishes to find her path made pleasant by courtesy and kindness will change a couple of dollar bills into glittering dimes before setting out upon a journey. A judicious expenditure of these shining coins will greatly facilitate progress on a journey.

Prudent persons always make provisions for their meals before they undertake a journey. If dining-room cars are on their train they rest content with the prospect of well-served dinners. Otherwise they lay in a supply of paraffine paper, Japanese napkins and dainty luncheon morsels such as thin sandwiches and fruit.

No person who has once had the experience of pausing "twenty minutes for refreshments," or of testing the toughness of railroad sandwiches ever puts herself for a second time in a position where she has to sustain life on them.

The tourist can make herself disagreeable in several ways. She may insist upon having her ideas about light and air dominate her immediate neighborhood to the discomfort of her companions. She may regard the porter as her personal servant and keep him busy upon her errands. She may tell every one near her that they are going to see and she may act as a sort of preliminary human guide book. In these ways she may command the intense dislike of her fellow-travellers.

Belt Buckles.

The belt buckle is here in all its glory. The latest in the way of an inexpensive buckle is of filigree silver set with imitation turquoise. This, fastened to a belt of white silk, is very fetching. Filigree silver is also used with enamelling. One new buckle shows a deep-blue enamel heart framed in filigree silver. The jewelled buckles are works of art. Many of them are studded with gems. One given as an engagement present to a belle showed a natural-looking white rose in pink enamel with the curls and petals glistening with diamond dew drops. This exquisite flower was fastened to a belt of pale pink silk. Belt buckles of yellow gold twisted into the form of a coiled snake are considered fashionable. The snake's eyes are precious stones.

Soaps for the Face.

"There are few soaps that one can risk using on the face, and even soap will not remove grime as well as the least bit of cocoa butter. You should be able to get it at any drug store, but be careful that it is not rancid, and get only a small quantity at a time, as it is best to have it sweet."

"If you want to test its cleansing powers, put a little of the cocoa butter on a soft cloth rag after you have washed and dried your face, wipe off your face with this and you will see by the blackened cloth that it does its work more thoroughly than soap and water. It softens the skin and unlike other oils, leaves no traces of greasiness behind it."

WATERMELON ICE.
Cut in half, scoop out the entire center, taking out the seeds. Chop in tray; add a cup of sugar. Pack in the freezer, turn a few minutes. It will be like soft snow and delicious.

Fresh meats and game should always be kept in a dry, cool place; but not in a place where milk and butter are kept; the latter, being rapid absorbers, will soon be injured in flavor if allowed to remain in the same small inclosure with meat or vegetables.

Latest News From Western Ontario.

Coal now sells at \$5 a ton at St. Thomas.

The water question is greatly worrying the Windsorites.

St. Thomas sets \$150 from Barnum's circus for a license to show in the city.

The first thimbleberries of the season were sold in St. Thomas on Tuesday.

A move is again being made towards making a public park out of the Spohn flats in St. Thomas.

Mrs. Lemuel Smith, aged 21, of St. Thomas, died on Monday of paralysis. She had been married only five months.

License Inspector Pacaud has, through his solicitors, issued a writ of habeas corpus for the Windsor Review.

The resignation of Rev. James Bryant, of Merrittton and Port Robinson, has been accepted by the Hamilton Presbytery.

Thieves broke into the postoffice at Burlington on Monday and stole \$1 50 in stamps and coppers and a bundle of telegraph labels.

The Elgin Fair Association will hold a four days' show at St. Thomas this year, Sept. 10 to 13, and provide a programme of special attractions.

W. Allen, a merchant of Essex, while riding a bicycle, ran into a milk wagon. His collar bone was broken and he was badly cut about the head.

The funeral of the late Charles Whitlaw, of Paris, was attended by the town council and board of education, in both of which bodies the deceased had served.

The residence of Mr. Fred Latson, of West Montrose, was totally destroyed by fire on Tuesday morning. A defective flue was the cause. The house was insured.

While Mr. John McKenzie was harvesting near Rondeau on Monday morning lightning struck him and the horse, killing the latter instantly. The man was picked up unconscious, but will recover.

Edward Murphy pleaded guilty before Judge Hughes, of St. Thomas, to breaking into and stealing tickets from the London and Sharnburg stations of the M. C. R. He was remanded a week for sentence.

Mr. Robert Gray, of Wm. Gray & Sons, carriage manufacturers, Chatham, is a victim of burglars. Monday night his residence was entered by expert thieves, and three watches, several rings and a quantity of silver plate stolen.

Mayor Mason, of Windsor, will not be elected mayor this year, as he was defeated by a few votes.

GETTING FAT IN FIVE MINUTES

An Amusing Trick Invented by One of the Ravel Fantomists.

One of the most amusing and astonishing of pantomime tricks ever originated was that of a fat man, says Pearson's Weekly. This was done by the Ravel. One of the actors in the pantomime sits at a table and ravenously eats dish after dish of food that serves him to him. Presently the man, who, like most ravenous eaters, was rather thin and scraggy, begins to grow plump. His clothes fit him exactly. His waistcoat steadily swells out under the very eyes of the audience. All the while he is eating like a sausage machine. In a few moments he has grown to be a giant, eight or nine feet tall, and with the proportions of the inflated balloon. The sight always brings forth roars of laughter. It is comparatively easy to produce it after you know how. The food eaten is all "property food," and is made of tissue paper. The actor chews up into little bits and takes out of his mouth whenever occasion offers. His clothes are all of rubber, and made to fit air-tight around the wrists and neck. To sitting down he puts the heel of one boot over a little trap in the stage; an assistant immediately couples a tube running from a pair of bellows to a hole in the boot heel; then he blows him up.

It must be a rather unpleasant sensation to the actor to feel that he is nothing more than a wind bag, but actors are made to suffer. By the time the suit has grown to its full size the wind supply is cut off and the boot heel plugged up. Then, by an ingenious arrangement of springs under the actor's feet the height is acquired.

BELLIGERENT BANNOCKS.

Wyoming Indians on the War Path—Military Help Asked For.

Washington, D. C., July 17.—The Secretary of the Interior today received the following telegram from Gov. W. A. Richards of Wyoming, dated July 15: "Have just received a telegram dated Marydale, Wyoming, stating that nine Indians were arrested, one killed and others escaped. Many Indians are reported here threatening lives and property. Immediate action on your part is absolutely necessary. (Signed) Frank H. Rhodes, justice of the peace."

Gov. Richards states that he has received other advices, representing the situation as serious. The Indians are Bannocks, from Fort Hall, Idaho, arrested for illegal and wanton killing of game. Gov. Richards asks if the secretary can take immediate action for the protection of the settlers.

PRIVATELY DISCUSSED.

Montreal Physicians Beginning Largely to Prescribe a New Remedy.

Murray, of Aylmer, located on the fourth concession of Malahide, drove to Aylmer Saturday with his daughter, a man named Johnston and a Miss Peneil. The horses became frightened about two miles from the town and the occupants were thrown out of the vehicle. Mr. Johnston and Miss Luckland escaped injury, Miss Peneil had a leg broken, and Mr. Auckland received such serious injuries about the head that he died yesterday morning.
