Goderich, Auburn and Other Postmasters

Come in for a General Overhauling-A Number of Charges Investigated.

Goderich, Feb. 5.—Commissioner Seager has opened the investigation here in the matter of the public officials against whom charges of partisanship have been made. The first case was that of Mr. Munro, postmaster of Auburn. President Joseph Beck and Secretary James Mitchell, of the West Huron Conservative Association, were examined, and from their evidence and the minutes of the association it was shown that Postmaster Munro had been in the habit of attending mass meetings and nominating conventions, and taking a more or less active in-terest in politics. His name appeared a nominee for Parliamentary honors. Mr. D. McGillicuddy testified that the postmaster had acted as chairman at a meeting in June last in the interest of the Conservative candidate, and Mr. William Sturdy gave evidence that he had driven Mr. Munro to the convention at Smith's Hill last May, at which Candidate McLean was nominated. Evidence was also given that Mr. Munro was an efficient postmaster and a good man. The commissioner stated that it was his intention to submit the facts as adduced in evi-dence to the Postmaster-General's De-

partment, and that there the question would be finally dealt with.

In the case of Postmaster J. M. Roberts, of Dungannon, the acting postmaster's testimony was given that on more than one occasion Mr. Roberts had been chairman at Conservative meetings, but his fairness as a chairman was not questioned. Secretary James Mitchell, of the Conservative Association, and other witnesses

gave testimony. Yesterday the charges against Mr. Wm. Campbell, postmaster, Goderich, were gone into. Miss Jackell and Miss Agnes Hays were called, and said that in the fall of 1894 while they were attending the model school at Goderich and went to the postoffice one evening to mail a letter, the wicket was closed and Mr. Campbell came out the public office and received the letter, and, remarking that they were two fine model girls, apparently attempted to put his arm around Miss Hays, which she prevented by stepping out of his way, and they left the office much offended. Several witnesses were called to prove interference in politics. James C. McIntosh, William McDonald and others gave evidence about certain let-
