FINE AND COOLER.

Toronto, Sept. 3-3 p.m.—An area of high pressure is spreading over the lakes, and will extend throughout Eastern Canada, bringing with it fine weather and somewhat lower temperatures from the lakes to the Atlantic. In the Northwest there is a depression centered over Alberta, which is causing unsettled, showery weather. This depression will move eastward and cause unsettled weather in Manitoba today. Minimum and maximum temperatures: New Westminster, 54-66; Calgary, 40-46; Prince Albert, 40-54; Qu'Appelle, 40-54; Winnipeg, 44-62; Port Arthur, 44-64; Toronto, 60-84; Ottawa, 62-82; Montreal, 62-78; Quebec, 60-70; Halifax, 60-72.

Forecasts for the lower lakes, Georgian Bay, Ottawa Valley and Upper St. Lawrence: Fair and cooler, with north-west to northeast winds. Today sun rises 5:43, sets 6:51; moon rises 4:17 a.m., sets 5:52 p.m.

At a meeting of the London Fraternity of Musicians held Saturday evening to consider the discrimination against a musical organization by the city council and Western Fair board, the members of the above fraternity passed the following resolution unanimously:

"We, the undersigned members of the London Fraternity of Musicians, are very much astonished that the Musical Society Band was not engaged to play in the park this summer, notwithstanding their application to the council. Why they were so discriminated against, we cannot understand, unless it be one reason, viz., inability. This reason, however, does not in this case exist, and it is our opinion that no single band (of other bands of equal ability) are organized in the municipality should have a monopoly of grants made from the citizens' money. Again, we understand that the Western Fair board has also discriminated against this band this year. We humbly ask, why?"

"ROSH HASHOM"

Today the Jewish New Year is Celebrated

Throughout All the World—A Day of Good Will to All People.

This (Monday) evening at sundown, the New Year 5660, according to the Jewish calendar, will be ushered in with services in all synagogues and temples throughout the world.

"Rosh Hashomo," as the festival is called, does not correspond with the secular New Year of January, though greetings and good wishes are exchanged, as is customary then. Even the orthodox Jew does not nowadays transact business affairs according to the Jewish calendar; hence the New Year about to be celebrated is solely a religious celebration.

Of all the Jewish festivals, this day has retained a more universal hold upon the Jew than all others, with the possible exception of "Yom Kippur," or atonement day, which occurs ten days later.

The date, 5660, is derived by a series of calculations based partly upon Biblical data, and partly upon tradition. Although Jewish thought has kept even pace with scientific discovery, and no well-informed Jew of today believes that the world is only 5660 years old, the religious new year, hypothetically, takes its date from the creation.

It is computed that 2448 years elapsed between the creation and the exodus from Egypt; from that time until the destruction of the second temple, 1,330 years ago. This latter event corresponds in date to the year 68 of the Christian era. Hence, to know what year it is according to the Jewish calendar, one must subtract 68 from 1500 (the next secular year), and add 2,448 and 1,330, which gives us the result, 5,660.

The Jewish year is a lunar one, but, as the solar years and lunar years do not correspond, and the seasons of the festival are fixed by Biblical ordinance, the Jewish year is in constant conjunction with the Mohammed lunar year—not movable; that is to say, by a system of intercalary months, the discrepancy between the solar and lunar years (about eleven days in favor of the former), is equalized. For certain ritualistic reasons, New Year day may only fall upon a Monday, Tuesday, Thursday or Saturday.

Leviticus, xxiii., 24-25, ordains that the first day of the seventh month be observed as a solemn day of rest, a memorial to the "blowing of the horn," a holy convocation. While other festivals of the Jewish year are marked by ritualistic services of great grandeur and many sacrifices, especially in the orthodox synagogues, New Year day is made distinctive chiefly through "the blowing of the horn."

This horn was primitively a ram's horn, though there is reason to believe that in the prosperous days of the beautiful temple a magnificent silver instrument was employed. In the orthodox church of today the ram's horn is still used, though in the reformed church, where the spirit rather than the letter of the law is observed, the custom has arisen to have an appropriate psalm sung to the accompaniment of trumpets in lieu of the shrill notes prescribed by the early rabbinical authorities.

The day is one of goodwill to all, and its social distinctions are not greatly different from the New Year of those that reckon time according to the Christian era. It is the most propitious occasion for the exchange of civilities, and the compliments of the season. In the church of the synagogue, the prayers of that day is that all men, without distinction of race or creed, be recorded in the book of life to a year of happiness and good works. And, as the friends meet one another at the synagogue or on the street, they greet, in Hebrew, the wish, "For a good year may you be recorded."

REV. DR. SOWERBY

Preaches His Initial Sermon as Pastor of the Talbot Street Baptist Church—An Able Speaker.

Rev. Dr. A. T. Sowerby preached his inaugural sermon as pastor of the Talbot Street Baptist Church yesterday morning to an unusually large congregation. Dr. Sowerby is a clear, forcible speaker, and he made a very favorable impression upon his hearers. He took his text from Jeremiah, iv., 3: "For thus saith the Lord to the men of Judah and Jerusalem, break up your fallow ground and sow not among thorns."

"The human heart," said the reverend gentleman, in opening, "is as the soil of the earth. All kinds of seed may be sown therein. It may bring forth a healthful production for our Creator, or it may bring forth a shameful and unfruitful production. God's great call to man is the culture of the human heart. If the heart is uncultured it must naturally bring forth thorns. God's sowing times are often actually destroyed, and the spring passes because you and I neglect our opportunities to accept Christ. I am here as an ambassador of Christ, asking you to root out the briars from your heart and break up the fallow ground therein. This must be done if you would have good seed in your heart. It is a hard thing to turn away from the world to Jesus. Hundreds of men would receive the gospel if they could remain just as they are; but they must first break up the fallow ground and not sow among thorns. To the children and put the good seed into their heart first. Get right impressions there. First impressions, I know, are always most lasting. If we bear good fruit for the Lord, Don't let your heart be a barren one. Break up your fallow ground at once, and enter into the service of Jesus."

There are at the present day," continued the speaker, "many barren churches. I believe our first work is to bring up the spirituality of the church. The dead church is the unfruitful church, and stands in the world today. A church of power is what we want, not simply to exist for itself, but for others. What are you, as members of this church, going to do as a body? Will you simply go on existing among yourselves, or will you be a church of power? I remember once hearing of a man, who applied for a ticket to travel on a stage coach. On appearing at the ticket office he was asked whether he wanted a first, second or third class ticket. After consideration he took a third, and upon getting in the coach he found that the first, second and third class passengers all rode together. He could not understand why the rates differed, but suddenly the coach stopped at the bottom of a huge hill about a mile long, and the driver cried first-class passengers sit still; second-class get out and walk; third-class get out and push. Now this is very often the way with the church. The first-class sit still and let the others work, the second do a little, but trust to the third to do the main part of the work. My friends, that will never do. Every body must work to make the church a powerful one for good. God has our duty to do it. May the Lord help

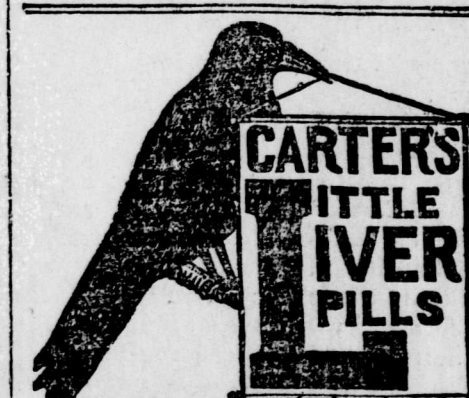
us one and all to break up the fallow ground in our hearts today that it may bring forth good fruit." In the evening Dr. Sowerby preached to another large congregation on "The Thorn in the Flesh."
