# Britain Is Not Idle

Active Operations at Arsenals and Garrisons.

Position of British Troops in South Africa Critical.

Reserves Receive Parliamentary Notice To Be Prepared.

Natal Volunteers Going to the Front-Excitement at Cape Town.

London, Oct. 2.-No confirmation is obtainable from any source of the report contained in a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company that the Boers have captured Dundee. Mr. Chamberlain and the Earl of Selbourne were absent from the colonial office, but Lord Lansdowne, Gen. Lord Wolseley and Gen. Sir Evelyn Wood were busily engaged at the war office. Gen. Sir Redvers Buller called at the war office in the afternoon, and a special board meeting was held. Naturally nothing of the discussion was made public, but it is understood that Gen. Sir Redvers Buller will not proceed for the Cape until next week except in case

of unforeseen developments. Many members of parliament are returning to town in anticipation of an early summoning of the houses of Parliament. It is the general impression that, although some speakers may express disapproval of the government policy, few will go to the extreme of voting against the required credit. It is considered more probable that they will abstain from participating in a

MILITARY ACTIVITY.

Reports from various arsenals and garrisons in Great Britain testify to the active continuance of military preparations. The reserves have received preliminary notice to be prepared, and several regiments have been notified to hold themselves in readiness for active service.

The Daily Telegraph publishes a dispatch from Pretoria giving the Boer view of the situation. Its correspondent says: Young and old are fully determined to fight, whatever may be said to the contrary. A large number of English and old uitlanders have enrolled themselves in defense of their adopted country. The highest gov-ernment officials throw all the blame of hostilities on the British Government. They would gladly avoid war if that were possible. Even now President Kruger would personally appeal to the Queen and Lord Salisbury, but that such an act would be construed as weakness.

IN THE TRANSVAAL. London, Tuesday, Oct. 3.-A dispatch

from Pretoria says: Fighting is expected on Wednesday. The rumor that it has already started is groundless.

The Natal field artillery, carbineers and other military commands are encommend at Showground on the red. camped at Showground, on the road leading to the Orange Free State. Pretoria is somewhat quieter, but detachments of burghers are still moving towards Volksrust, to the nearest station to the Natal border.

The latest advices show that the

latest Transvaal mobilization has been rapid and comprehensive. The cable department officials at the Cape say it is impossible to reach Pre-toria over the Durban line. The Cape Town-to-Pretoria line is still working, but it is glutted with official messages.

TALK OF A RAID. Advices received from Ladysmith. Natal, this morning says that 500 burghers have assembled at Albertina, in the Orange Free State, with the object of proceeding in the direction of the border, and that it is feared a raid 6. Ladysmith is meditated. AT JOHANNESBURG.

The dispatches from Johannesburg say no commandeering took place there Saturday. They add that Boers are anxious to leave, and that only the young men are forming comps of civilian police, and are acting conjunction with the merchants' association. The town is quiet. The merchants' committee announces that British subjects under permit will be allowed to remain.

By the Recent Earthquakes That Shook Aidin.

Chinese Emperor Is To Be Skill-

fully Dethroned, It's Said. Piague Serum Saves Many Lives-Rats

Sink a Steamer. Constantinople, Oct. 3.-It is now estimated that 1,500 perished in the earthquakes in Asia Minor, around Aidin. The first shock occurred at 4 o'clock in the morning of Sept. 20, and lasted 40 seconds. The effects were appailing. Whole villages were completely destroyed. The earthquake was felt as

far as Scio, Milliene and Smyrnia. The latest advices from the stricken area show that men, women and children were buried in the ruins of their dweiling places before they realized their danger. Numbers of bodies suil lie beneath the debris. About our persons were kined at Sarakeni and some boo at Demzen, where three-tourins of the buildings rell. There was proportionate loss of life in many or the smaller villages.

The discurpance has not yet subsided, although its strength appears to be spent. The shocks continue almost daily, but with no great violence. The population is encamped in the open.

BRITISH WHEAT MARKET. London, Oct. 3.—The wheat market during the week has displayed a generai lack of activity, notwithstanding the threshings. English wheat is stated to be fully up to, if not above, the average for this period of the year. The market here has been sparsely supplied. Seliers have nrmly agnered to late rates. Buyers, however, are exercising caution, and trade is a result is of a restricted nature. Arrivals of foreign qualities have come to hand in moderate quantities. A firm tone

has predominated. The Mark Lane Express says: "The wheat yield per acre in such important centers as Lincoln, Norfolk and Cambridge are noticeably smaller than last season, but still is up to a full average. The west has crops above the mean, and the excess being often four bushels to the acre over a small average in many western districts.

TO DETHRONE THE EMPEROR. Advices from Pekin say: Arrangements for the dethronement of Emperor Kuang Hsu are proceeding apace. The empress dowager's choice has definitely fallen on Pu Tsuan, the y-yearold son of Duke Tsai Lan, to succeed Kuang Hsu. The candidate can only speak the Manchu dialect and knows no Chinese. Kuang Hsu has already been urged to draw up a memorial to the empress dowager asking to be allowed to resign his throne owing to his chronic iliness. At the third tender the resignation is to be accepted. There are rumors that perhaps Russia will have something to say before the dethronement takes place, and is prepared to send a large force to Pekin in a

RATS SINK A STEAMER. The steamer White Cloud, which was proceeding from Hong Kong to Manila under an American charter, foundered about 90 miles from Hong Kong and seven men were drowned. The captain's boat, containing six people, was picked up by a Chinese junk and taken to Shanghai. The disaster is said to have been due to the ravages of white rats.

PLAGUE SERUM SAVES LIVES. Prof. Calmette, at Paris, the Pasteur Institute commissioner, who has returned from Oporto, says that before his arrival the mortality among those stricken with the bubonic plague amounted to 33 per cent. Of 15 treated with serum not one died. In three days he inoculated 423 persons.
