Sir Wilfrid Laurier Explains His Gen. Gaselee's banquet in Pekin in honor of the Americans, expressing Position in Regard to It.

Would Not Give Summary Jurisdiction to Police Magistrates-Various Bills in Committee.

Ottawa, May 8.—The Quebec judges bill, the pension bill and the resolution granting \$30,000 a year to Prince Edward Island in payment of all claims against the Dominion arising out of the non-fulfillment of the terms of confederation, were passed through committee in the house today. No estimates were discussed, and the house

rose at 1:10 a.m. ALIEN LABOR BILL The house went into committee upon the bill to restrict the importation and employment of aliens. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that after consideration he had been unable to accept the proposition of Mr. Clarke, to give summary jurisdition to police magistrates and magistrates general-The bill provided for a penalty inging from \$1,000 to \$50, and that the consent of the attorney-general of the province or the superior court judge is necessary to action.
