each containing ten one-pound packages, made at a creamery. The committee will pay for exhibits at market price, and also pay all transportation charges, but should there be anything that is not considered of good enough quality to send to Buffalo the express charges to Toronto will be deducted when remitting for the cost of such exhibits. Expert judges have been appointed

to examine exhibits in Toronto and pass those they deem suitable for exhibition to Buffalo. Arrangements have been made by which there will be no limit as to the number of the exhibits that may be submitted to the judges at the Pan-American. All this committee insists
