Intense Suffering of British Soldiers in Africa.

Lack of Water a Greater Menace to the Army Than the Bullets of the Boers.

[New York Sun.]

Water more than all other needs for the soldier in the constant craving of men who march under the sun and shoot. The immediate objective of every fight in South Africa is the control of the water supply. The man who fails to attain it must sheer off—must seek the next one, which means a retreat, for there are rarely more than two or three miles of water.

The big pitched battles decided the command of the main rivers and the hills that bound their watersheds. They were the decisive points of the strategy. ALMA COLLEGE WAS DAMAGED BY FIRE.

Loss Estimated at \$1,000—A Central Park Building Destroyed.

St. Thomas, Ont., Feb. 16.—Fire broke out in the Alma College about two o'clock this afternoon, the building at one time being threatened with total destruction. The fire started upstairs, in the east wing of the building, and before the brigade could get the flames under control, five or six rooms were gutted. Several of the students lost their entire wardrobe. The loss will be about \$1,000. Origin of the fire is unknown.

New York, Feb. 16.—The building on Central Park West, occupied for many years by Durand's riding academy, was destroyed, and its neighbor, the Pollon apartment house, slightly damaged yesterday by fire that threatened for a time to prove more destructive. The first firemen to attack the burning building were caught in a "back draught," and several were badly hurt. The old academy was built fifteen years ago by Boston capitalists at a cost of \$100,000. It was being converted into a hippodrome. The chief damage to the Pollon was to the roof of the building. Its hundreds of tenants fled from their apartments when the heat began to crack the windows.

TORONTO PROHIBITIONISTS. Toronto, Ont., Feb. 17.—A large and enthusiastic meeting of prohibitionists was held here Saturday night. Rev. W. R. Parker presiding. The meeting was unanimous in saying that the present conditions were totally unfair to the cause of prohibition. They objected to being required to poll more than have authority when a referendum was submitted, and held that the right time for voting on the question was the day of the municipal elections in 1903. The following resolution was passed: "Resolved that it will be the duty of prohibitionists in the coming campaign to oppose any members of the legislature who support the unfair conditions of the proposed referendum." It was decided to send a statement of their objections to the government, and to have each member, representing an answer from the government before the convention, to be held on the 25th inst.

The thing that a man would not do for the sake of water cannot be named. In the British division had got to the point where they were without water and did not know where to turn to find any.
