# ON THE VELDT

Intense Suffering of British Soldiers in Africa.

Water a Greater Menace Army Than the Bullets of the Boers.

[New York Sun.]

Water more than all other needs put together is the constant craving of men who march under the sun and immediate objective of every fight in South Africa is the con trol of a "fontein." The side tha The side that fails to attain it must sheer off-must seek the next one, which means a retreat, for there are rarely more than two in a day's journey.

The big pitched battles decided the ommand of the main rivers and the hills that bound their watersheds. They were the scenes of the early strategy. Lord Methuen had to get back to the water after he failed to dislodge Piet Cronje at Majersfontein, for there was no water where the un-successful assailant found himself after the attack. Cronge himself, when he found the danger of being dislodge Piet Cronje at Magersfontein, stronghold, was compelled, for reasons of water, to keep along the banks of the Modder in his forced march to the east, and it was in the riverbed at Paardeberg that he met his finish. Everyone knows how "Ferryman Bulclung to the river up and down the Tugela. These were the big fights between the large numbers, and the soldiers needed something like a running river close at hand if they were to keep alive.

But for a long time now all the characteristic maneuvers of the "mounted feet" on both sides-of the Boers who have moved on horseback and fought on foot all the time, and of the Dritish mounted infantry who are trying to organize on similar lines-have had for their indispensable end access to enough water for man and beast to efresh both for the next move. Every "laager" and "pan" and "vlei" belongs to the "fontein" family, and each denotes an oasis in the dry landscape of the veldt. These "fonteins" are never the limpid, plashing water that is brought to the eye by the charm of the word "fountain." Assuredly they are not wells, which is often ventured as a rough translation of the word. They are like nothing except themselves. The military map-maker has been known to describe them as

'copious water." Late in the afternoon before the battle of Driefontein, or Abram's Kraal, as some call it, this writer was with Gen. French's staff. The English cavalry division had finished its prescribed trek for the day. Its outposts were within skirmishing touch of the burgher patrol of Deleary and Dewet's army. The rapid twilight closed around 6,000 men and as many horses, beside an odd thousand of transport mules, and every mouth among them asked only to quench thirst and resta

The general's aide-de-camp unfolded his war office map and remarked in "This is what we have got and artistic document. Its scale was large, in the proportion of inches to Kidney Pills. and to nothing else." miles; much was printed over it about the traversible possibilities of the country it represented, and some of its most important features were dis-tinguished by colored tints, which had their counterpart and translation on the margin. The color of the place we were on meant "copious water." yond a doubt there was to be seen a "fontein" not a quarter of a mile away. It looked like a big enough pond for a farm, where a hundred cattle might wade and drink in comfort daily. But here was a division of cavalry. The transport wagons and gun carriages were parked in rows for the night. Their draft teams freed from their weary pull turned waterward. In ten minutes the "fontein" was of the color and consistency of

black porridge. A few horses and mules not strong enough to pull any further put their last energy into a trot which brought them to the middle of the pond. There they were too perfectly happy to drink. So they settled down forward, rolled over and died drowning. The others drank their fill of mud with gasping sides, and the men made the best of it loading their cook pots and water bottles. By rest time the "fonwas so drained that a lancer could have stuck a lance in the middle of it and it would have stood up-

But the cavalry division had had its "copious water." It could get scarcely a drop more in the morning and was in consequence not at its best for rapid work. So much the worse for the big crowds, and so much the better for the agile, roving commandos. For the "fontein" decided the question of transport and they were on the side of the burghers.

Other means of getting water are not readily devised. Near Kroonstad there have been for years two bore holes 3,000 feet deep. The water they have tapped comes to within fifteen feet of the surface and by pumping a good stream of clear water could always be kept up. But the idea of artesian wells to water a field force was altogether too slow even for such a deliberate organization as the British army.

The thing that a man would not do for the sake of water cannot be nam-ed. Life itself was the price hundreds of times. If the British soldiers were ever near mutiny it was at nightfall when they were without water and did not know where to turn to find

On the night after the first Modder River fight darkness came before half of Lord Methuen's division had got within a mile of the river. The agony of thirst so mastered some of them that they would have drained the boilers of the locomotives of the mili-tary trains at rail head. In case of emergency the locomotives were kept with steam up and boilers filled all night through. The engineers in compassion gave one after another his waterbottle filled until hundreds clamored around them. Very soon per-emptory orders were shouted from the railroad officer that the engineer who gave another drop of water would be court-martialed. The thirst-maddened soldiers groaned as under a death sentence. For the rest of the night they waited their turn to lie across the rails under the engine boilers, catching the hot, greasy leakages from the waste

tens of thousands that took the chances of fever by drinking any water they got near, there was evolved an enteric type. He was the man who had abruptly changed his mode of liv-ing. If he used to drink considerably before the campaign, and its priva-tions kept all stimulants from him, he was very liable to go down. If he had been abstemious before, and sought to brace himself against exhaustion with spirits when he could get them, again he was a likely subject. As with most fevers of, the kind, scarcely a man over 40 was infected.

The Boers had comparatively little enteric. They moved in smaller bodies and consequently there was more good water to go round. Their mode of transit saved them from the thirst of foot marches. The Boer and the "fon-tein" were made for each other. For the size of their country, they do not happen very frequently, and they haven't proved accommodating to strangers who have sought to put them to untried uses.

#### ALMA COLLEGE WAS DAMAGED BY FIRE.

Loss Estimated at \$1,000-A Central Park Building Destroyed.

St. Thomas, Ont., Feb. 16.-Fire broke out in the Alma College about two o'clock this afternoon, the building at one time being threatened with total destruction. The fire started upstairs, in the east wing of the building and before the brigade could get the flames under control, five or six rooms were Several of the students lost their entire wardrobe. The loss will be about \$1,000. Origin of the fire is

unknown New York, Feb. 16.-The building on Central Park west, occupied for many years by Durland's riding academy, was destroyed, and its neighbor the Poillon apartment house, slightly damaged yesterday by fire that threatened for a time to prove more destructive. The first firemen to attack the burning building were caught in "back draught," and several were badly hurt. The old academy was built fifteen years ago by Boston capitalists at a cost of \$100,000. It was being converted into a hippodrome. chief damage to the Poillon was to the roof of the building. Its hundreds of tenants fled from their apartments when the heat began to crack the windows.


