Sailors of Every Clime.

Today the sailors of eight nations—England, Germany, France, Italy, Holland, Mexico, Argentina and the United States—were gathered along the streets of New York mingling with others from north, south and east and west in the first day of Hudson-Fulton celebration yesterday. Beginning at noon, Riverside Drive, a vantage point affording a view of the anchorage, began to fill rapidly, and at 3 o'clock was again unobscuredly crowded, although there was no organized naval parade today.

The Half Moon and the Clermont lay at their anchorages, where they will remain until the naval parade of Friday, October 1, when, escorted by the light draft warships and followed by the merchant fleet, they will be turned over to the Albany up-state division of the celebration and the festivities in New York City will end. The fleet of battleships today there was an atmosphere of a line of crowded excursion steamers. At the same time a scurrying flotilla of motor boats was carrying visitors to and from battleships.

Britain Leads.

Many officers spoke today of the splendid appearance presented by the flagships, whose appearance last was conspicuous, spick and span in her new paint and dressed from stern to stern in white awnings, her lines of speed and power more remarkable today than those of any other ship on the river.

Sunday services were conducted in all the ships. A form of prayer ascribed for the occasion by Bishop Greer, of the Episcopal Church, and Archbishop Farley, of the Roman Catholic Church, was read in every parish of the diocese. Many who could not get into the city crowded the church yards to view the fleet. The grave of Robert Fulton. Among them were officers of the vessels.

At historic St. Paul's Chapel the Rev. Montague Greer asked pertinently: "Is God a man of war?" and answered most emphatically, "Is not certainly." "God," said Dr. Greer, "is not an unconditional peacemaker, yielding to the dictates of men because we think universal peace a desirable condition for our comfort. Just so long as there are great nations unconverted to the gospel of Jesus Christ, just so long will the drums of war throb and the battle-flags remain unfurled."

The programme for tomorrow includes probable flights by Wilbur Wright and Glenn Curtiss from Governor's Island and the opening of various commemorative and art exhibits throughout the city.

Fete International.

The international aspect of the celebration is attested by the attendance of the foreign war ships. Besides the fifty vessels of the United States Atlantic fleet under Admiral Scheroeder, the foreign navies are represented by sixteen fighting craft in all. Great Britain has four, Germany has four also, France has two, Italy has two, Mexico has one, Argentina has one and Cuba has one.

The United States fleet is represented by the battleships Connecticut (15,000 tons), flagships (16,000), Kansas (16,000), Louisiana (16,000), Minnesota (16,000), New Hampshire (16,000), Mississippi (13,000), Idaho (13,000), Georgia (14,948), Jersey (14,948), Nebraska (14,948), Rhode Island (14,948), Virginia (14,948), Missouri (12,300), and Ohio (12,440). The armored cruisers North Carolina (14,500 tons, speed 22.28 knots), New York (8,200), Montana (14,500 tons, 22 knots), the scout cruisers Chester, Birmingham and Salem (3,750 tons, 25 knots), and a fleet of five submarines.

TEMPERANCE PARADE IN WICKED CHICAGO

Biggest in City's History—Their Banners Bid Defiance to the Foe.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—Chicago saw the biggest temperance parade in the history of the city yesterday afternoon. The spirit of Frances Willard, materialized in 25,000 prohibition enthusiasts, marched down Michigan avenue, swathed in banners, decorated with 1,000 transparencies and inspired by the music of a score of bands.

It was the greatest temperance parade Chicago ever had seen—and the most enthusiastic. From the time that General Frederick Dent Grant, as grand marshal, at the head of his aids and an escort of Grand Army veterans, swung off from Twenty-first street and Michigan avenue to lead the way down the boulevard until the journey was ended at Jackson Boulevard, and the river, the parade was a continual round of hymn singing, band blaring and cheers.

Fifty thousand people stood packed along the sidewalks of the loop and saw it go by. Hundreds of others watched it from balconies and the windows of skyscrapers. For thirty minutes after the loop crossings strived to contain the mesh of vehicles that choked the streets on every side and bring order to the chaos that threatened the lives and limbs of pedestrians.

Nearly every vehicle known to man had been mustered into service to take part in the demonstration. There were policemen and parade marshals on horseback and preachers and parishioners on foot. There were automobiles by the hundred, from the huge touring car and delivery wagon to the smallest of runabouts and the slickest of motor cycles. There were victorias and phaetons, trolleybuses, and shays, and every kind of conveyance. Every one of them was decorated with bunting and each carried some sort of a legend representing its compliments to the liquor traffic and inviting the voter to put it out of business.

The parade was to the average man a revelation of the power of the total abstinence sentiment in Chicago. Every section of the city was represented. Nearly every church, every temperance club and every reform organization sent its members. Such a huge outpouring of power could not but have its effect on the politician, who judges popular forces by numbers, and such a display of interest and enthusiasm must have commanded respect for the power of the movement which inspired it, even among those who were opposed to it.

The parade struck one great and sensitive popular chord. That was in the number of women and children who took part. A crowd of little boys marching under the banner "Can You Spare Yours?" was cheered. In contrast came the "original crusaders" in the temperance movement, men and women who had lived their best years in the fight. Among these was a woman of 84 years and another only a year from her grave. Mrs. W. C. T. U. ranks were Mrs. Emily Hill, president of the Cook County W. C. T. U., and a delegation from the national capital, led by Mrs. W. L. Cathorn.

KILLS A BURGLAR

AT END OF ROPE

Crack Shot Puts Two Bullets In Swinging Human Target.

New York, Sept. 27.—When a burglar swung by a rope from the roof of a flat house at No. 188 Bathgate avenue shortly before dawn today and forced the bathroom window of the flat of William Rosse, a civil engineer, on the fourth floor, he did not know he was invading the home of a man who is one of the best revolver shots in the city. Mr. Rosse, awakened by the burglar, shot him twice.

The body of the outlaw is yet unidentified at the Bathgate avenue police station. "I hit him where I aimed," said Mr. Rosse, quietly. "He slid down the rope and got a half block away from the house. I fired the first shot, but I felt sure I had him the moment I fired." The dead man was undoubtedly a professional house burglar, familiar with all the tricks of his trade. In one of his pockets was found a slip of paper marked "Diagram of roofs of houses in 106 and 107 street."

When the body had been taken to the station house Cullen, went to the roof of the Bathgate avenue flat where the shooting had occurred and found there a pair of shoes, slightly worn, and a black derby hat. They were close to a chimney to which was tied the rope that swung down from the bathroom window of Mr. Rosse's flat.

Inasmuch as Mr. Rosse admitted firing two shots that had evidently killed a man, a policeman Cullen took him around to the station house. All the policemen on duty shook hands with Mr. Rosse and he was installed in the captain's room with a box of cigars at hand to await action on the part of the coroner.

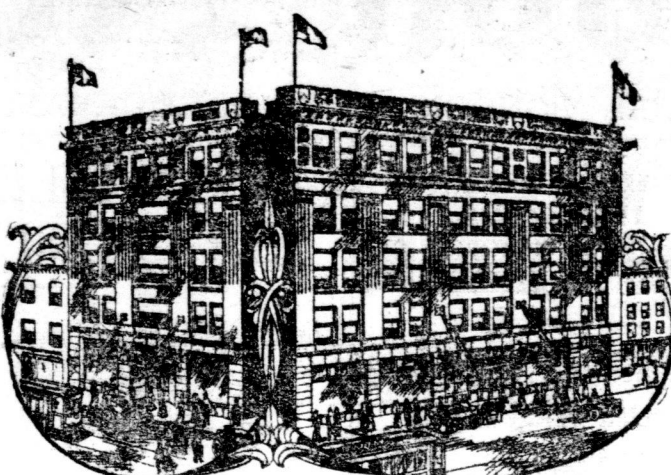

SERIES OF FRAUDS

A Number of Big Wholesale Dealers Victimized.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 25.—A remarkable series of frauds has been discovered here, in which Vancouver firms are interested, but where eastern Canadian and American wholesale houses have been victimized. Robert Kelly, head of Kelly, Douglas & Co., wholesale grocers, received a letter a week ago from an eastern supply house, thanking them for a large order, and stating that this firm was favorably impressed with Kelly's buyer, Mr. Blank. Kelly had no employee of that name, and an investigation showed that some confidence operator had victimized the wholesalers in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Batulon, Chicago, and other cities, had given orders in the name of Kelly, Douglas & Co., and cashed thousands of dollars of expense checks.

The operations were very extensive. From the number of checks now returned, it is evident that at least sixty have been cashed, from one hundred to three hundred dollars each. The checks were specially forged with the photo of Kelly, Douglas & Co. building, and marked "accepted" with a fake stamp of the Bank of Montreal. Lavish with orders, the confidence man had no trouble in securing unlimited cash. Thousands of dollars in bad checks are already in, and there is no way of telling how many carloads of goods are on the way west to the Kellys.

Operations probably started in Vancouver, for similar checks of other firms, marked "accepted" with a fake bank stamp, have turned up in two other banks here. The confidence man has probably cleaned up twelve thousand dollars at least.

BURGLARS INVADE ESSEX

Thirteen Houses Broken Into in Three Nights.

Windsor, Sept. 26.—Thirteen burglaries in three nights is the record of housebreakers who began their operations in Leamington on Monday, and have since been working east through Ontario, with stops at Tilbury and Ridgeway.

The thirteenth on the list was at the home of Phil Bowyer, member of the Ontario Legislature for one of the Kent ridings. The burglars probably expected a rich haul, but all they got was a handful of cigars.

Four Leamington homes were entered Monday night. Next night there were four burglaries in Tilbury, and the series up to date ended with five burglaries in Ridgeway Wednesday night, including the Bowyer home. In each case the work was done so quietly that the inmates knew nothing about it until next morning.

Detective Charles Mahoney, of Windsor, is convinced that all the burglaries were the work of one gang. The burglars overhauled silverware and other articles of value, and ransacked the houses for money. The total of their hauls did not exceed \$40.
