DR. W. H. DRAKE DEAD

Was the Oldest Physician in the County of Essex.

The death occurred in Windsor early yesterday morning of Dr. William H. Drake, father of Dr. F. P. Drake, of this city.
Dr. Drake was the oldest physician in Essex County, having practiced medicine at Kingsville for over 40 years. About 12 years ago Dr. Drake and family moved to Windsor.
He was born at Talbotville, Elgin County, 78 years ago, and was the son of a United Empire Loyalist. At the age of 21 years he graduated from the Toronto Medical College, and commenced active medical duties immediately.

While in Kingsville Dr. Drake was closely identified with the Conservative interests of the south riding, holding many important offices, and always taking an active interest in political matters in South Essex.

For the past year he had not enjoyed good health, and some time ago underwent an operation on his eyes for blindness, but without success. During the past week his condition grew serious.

He was a member of the Anglican Church of this city, and was also identified with the Masonic order in Kingsville.
Besides the widow, he is survived by the following: Dr. F. P. Drake, of London; F. A. Drake, barrister, of Toronto; W. E. Drake, Vancouver manager for the McClary Manufacturing Company, of London; H. O. Drake, of the Walkerville Bridge Company; A. B. Drake, of the law firm of Fleming & Drake; and Mrs. O. E. Fleming. A brother also survives in Cincinnati, O. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon at Kingsville, in the family plot in the Anglican Cemetery.

CORRESPONDENCE

"To Make Men Weep."

Verily, our municipal government is "a spectacle to make men and angels weep." Those who so strongly censured the city council of 1909 are seeking for corners to hide themselves in, for, although the aforesaid council were noted for their fondness for travel at the city's expense, still when they were at home, they attended to business fairly well. There were some wise heads among them, too. On the other hand, the "Municipal Muddlers" of 1910 have distinguished themselves by a do-nothing policy, and will certainly go down to posterity "unwept, unhonored and unsung." Yet, 20, we speak too hastily, they have created new offices. We have now a consulting engineer. True, he never is consulted, but, what matter? It is a good, high-sounding title, and must carry weight with other and less-favored municipalities. We have also a publicity agent, who, some carping critics would have us believe, only emerges from obscurity when he wishes to draw his salary, but, let us hope on some day he may do something. Then there is an assistant city engineer, who is certainly doing good work. There are sundry assistants to the assistant. There are numerous other officials with their staffs of clerks, etc. There is to be a plumbing inspector. With, of course, his assistants. The council of 1910 are also noted for importing officials from a distance, and turning down London men of known ability, but this, too, adds an element of interest to city affairs. There is a pleasing risk about the unknown. A kind of picturesque charm, a delightful uncertainty, which would be entirely lacking in a competent London man. After all, there is very much to be said in favor of this unique method of selecting officials and creating positions. It is original and striking, and no doubt gives our city the name of being a good place to leave, or remain away from.

Seriously, is it not time to do away with the aldermanic form of city government and adopt government by commissioners. Elect five good, honest men, give them good salaries, and they will easily gain their salaries in one year. This has been tried in 60 American cities, and has resulted in lowering taxes, wiping out of city debts and great improvements in streets and public buildings.

ROOT AT NEW YORK

Says an Early Fisheries Decision is Certain.

New York, Sept. 6.—United States Senator Elihu Root got in today on the North German Lloyd steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse after having spent a good part of the summer as head of the American counsel before the commission appointed to settle the Newfoundland fisheries dispute.

Senator Root said he spoke for six days, instead of five, before the commission. But that was not the longest speech, as Sir Robert Finlay spoke for eight days.

The senator said that the decision would, he expected, be announced tomorrow afternoon, and while he would say nothing concerning the outcome, it is understood that a decision in favor of the British claims is anticipated by counsel.

MOVING NORTHWEST'S CROP

Some 88,806,203 Bushels Shipped From Port Arthur and Fort William in a Year.

Ottawa, Sept. 6.—From the Canadian Northwest during the year ended Sept. 1, there were 88,806,203 bushels of grain shipped via Port Arthur and Port Arthur, as against 65,237,162 bushels in the year previous.
United States vessels handled 29,927,000, and Canadian 67,879,357 bushels.
From American ports 21,000,000 bushels of the wheat was reported, and from Canadian ports 42,000,000.

HEAVY RAINS IN TORONTO

Cellars Flooded and Sidewalks Washed Away—Sewers Inadequate.

Toronto, Sept. 6.—Numerous complaints of the flooding of cellars as a result of the heavy rainfall on Saturday and Monday, were received at the city hall this morning. Many of the complaints were from merchants on Yonge and Queen streets. "The sewers were absolutely unable to carry off the floods," said Dr. Shand, city medical officer. "They are too small, and by the flooding of basements and stores a great deal of damage was done."

About 200 feet of concrete sidewalk on Balmor Avenue, and 25 or 30 feet of walk on Queen street, opposite Small's Pond, were washed out in yesterday's storm. The sandy roadway on Kentworth avenue also was washed out to a considerable extent. The east end of the city suffered more from the storm of Saturday and yesterday than the west end.

Paris, Sept. 7.—The Matins' Lisbon correspondent quotes Alfonso Costa, a leading Republican deputy, as saying that despite the worst exhibition of electoral corruption he had ever witnessed, the Portuguese Republicans in the recent elections doubled their representation in the Chamber of Deputies, and now have an organization throughout the country which insures an early change in the regime of the kingdom.
