RUSSIA AND TURKEY HAVING SQUABBLE

Dispute Arises Over Question of What Is Contraband of War.

[Canadian Press.]

St. Petersburg, Oct. 12.—The text of the Russian note to Turkey regarding the free export of Russian corn was made public today. In reply to a Turkish demand that Russia should not export corn to Turkey, the Russian note stated that it intended to act according to the Declaration of London of 1909.

As this was considered unsatisfactory to Russia, the government presented a written demand wherein it was pointed out that Russia, basing her position upon the Declaration of London of 1909 and articles 24 and 25 of the Declaration of London, considered that cargoes of grain were subject neither to arrest nor confiscation when addressed to Russian ports in the Black Sea or to Italian ports, nor to the cargoes were destined for the Italian field forces or Italian official consignees. The note included: "Any attempt to arrest and confiscate the above-mentioned cargoes, Russia will regard as a violation of the rights of Russia, and the Government reserves the right to take such measures as may be necessary to protect its interests. Turkey will not be held responsible for any action taken by the Ottoman Government in this regard." The note also stated that the Ottoman Government intended to observe the Declaration of London.

Article 24 of the Declaration of London describes articles including foodstuffs and grain which may be treated as contraband of war. Article 33 explains "conditional contraband" as articles liable to capture if shown to be destined to be used for the purposes of war in progress. Article 34 sets forth that the destination referred to in the preceding article is presumed to be the destination of the cargo, and if the cargo is consigned to an enemy or the contractor of an enemy, but where the presumptions do not arise, the destination is presumed to be innocent.

WESLEY WRONG ON AMUSEMENTS

Methodist Delegates Regard Restrictions of Young People as "Great Blunder."

GOOD IMPULSES STIFLED

Give Children Right Ideals and the Church of Tomorrow Can Do Anything.

[Canadian Press.]

Toronto, Oct. 13.—With the close of the Ecumenical Methodist Conference many delegates already are leaving the city, as scores of ministers planned to occupy their pulpits in the United States and Canada on Sunday. A majority of the delegates from other countries will remain throughout the sessions, and a number of them will visit American cities to study various phases of church and social work.

Two subjects assigned for today's meetings are: "The Larger Use of Lay Agencies and 'Woman's Claims and Responsibilities.'" The speakers on the programme include Prof. S. J. Atkins, of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, Norman T. C. Sargent, of London, England, on "Laymen and Home Evangelization," Richard Lee, of Wigan, England, on "The Priesthood of the People," Mrs. Joseph Johnson, of London, England, on "Methodism and the Women's Movement," Mrs. Lucy R. Meyers, of Chicago, on "Deaconesses and Sisterhood," and Mr. George O. Robinson, of Detroit, Mich., on "Woman's Work in the Church."

Intest of Young People.

The problem of retaining the interest of the young people in the church is one of the most frequently discussed at informal meetings in connection with the conference. Rev. William Bradford, of Irlby, England, has been heard to say that the church is too much outside the home. "They have all too often no place in their hearts for their parents," he said. "I wish to protest against the cowardly abdication of man in relating to the mother the entire religious training of the child." Rev. H. Hudson, of New Zealand, held that Wesley's restrictions on amusements for young people is acknowledged to have been a great mistake. "We are not interested in control, rather than have measures of sweeping prohibition," was advocated by Mr. Hudson.

How many thousands of young people go out into the world, untrained in important essentials, because of some of their best impulses growing out of the inherent spirit of play were stifled by the crabbed, circumvented views of the head of the church.

Captured the Mint.

The Times correspondent says the rebels have captured not only the large Government arsenal at Han Yang, but also the mint, with 2,000,000 taels in silver bullion. It is expected that at any moment a sympathetic outbreak may be announced at Canton and there is also talk of a mutiny at Nanking and other large centres.

A Shanghai dispatch to the Times gives the opinion that the movement of the revolutionaries is not a spontaneous outbreak, but a carefully planned and executed movement. The revolutionaries are said to be in a position to deal with the Government forces in detail.

FOREIGNERS IN NO DANGER.

[Canadian Press.] London, Oct. 13.—Private advice received here today by missionary societies and commercial houses, with connections in China, confirm earlier reports of the safety of foreigners in that country. In fact, it is stated in advices from different points in China that the lives and property of foreigners are under the protection of both the contending parties, placards being posted forbidding any attack upon the property of foreigners.

The missionaries who are at present at home here on furloughs say that the rebellion did not come as a surprise, as the feeling against the Manchu dynasty has long been very bitter. They fear that the revolution will sweep rapidly, but believe that there will be no danger to foreigners unless the mobs get out of control by their leaders.

Peking, Oct. 13.—Consular advices received here today state that the

mandarin Hankow and the rebels have taken possession of the railway station. The allied foreign marines have landed and are protecting the foreign concessions under command of the Japanese admiral, Kawashima, the Japanese third squadron of the Japanese navy. The Chinese gunboats are anchoring off the foreign concessions for their own safety.

LIFE SENTENCE FOR SHERIDAN

One Jurymen Saves Slayer From Conviction On Murder Charge.

KILLING IS ADMITTED

Prisoner Agreed To Plead Guilty, and Received His Sentence Summarily.

Barrie, Oct. 13.—After deliberating for over four hours the jury in the trial of Arthur Sheridan, charged with the murder of Ross Ford, at Orillia, in August last, failed to agree, and was dismissed by the presiding judge, Sir John Boyd. The foreman, Mr. James Findlay, announced that the jury took eleven for murder and one for manslaughter. Mr. Robb, counsel for the prisoner, signified his willingness to enter a plea of guilty of manslaughter, and this was entered on the court record. The prisoner was then brought in and sentenced to life imprisonment in the Kingston Penitentiary. He accepted the verdict stoically.

The jury retired at 6 p.m. and at 9:20 they returned and announced that they were unable to reach an agreement. They were sent back by the chancellor, but after deliberating for an hour the foreman announced that there was no hope of an agreement.

Arthur Sheridan, the prisoner, was the first witness called for the defence. He related how he met Ford on the night of the dance. Sheridan and Ford walked down the road together, and Ford said that Sheridan had been telling lies about him, and they would have to fight it out. Sheridan said Ford struck him in the eye and knocked him down, then struck him in the eye, when they clinched, and Ford pushed him over a root, which tripped him.

Sheridan said he fell with Ford on top, Ford grabbed him by the throat and said: "I don't care if I kill you." Sheridan then described getting the knife out of his hip pocket, and the stabbing of Ford in the breast and on the shoulder. Ford then released his grasp on Sheridan's neck and Sheridan rolled him over, during which time he says the wound in the middle of the back was made.

Several witnesses from North Orillia were called to give character evidence for Sheridan. The consensus of opinion was that prisoner was quiet and inoffensive.

Rebuttal evidence commenced at 2:55. Dr. Carson stated that in his opinion the injured man could not have walked after receiving the knife wound in the chest. In his opinion the black eye which Sheridan claimed to have received when Ford is said to have struck him would not have lost its discoloration for 14 days.

Addresses by Counsel.

Mr. T. C. Robbette, K. C., in his address contended that the theory of the defence was walking behind Ford on the road and first stab him in the back was absurd. He held that Ford was the aggressor, and there was no evidence of premeditation.

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tion to murder on Sheridan's part.

Counsel for the crown, Mr. Peter White, K.C., commented on the prisoner's statement regarding the wounded man being able to get up and walk after the stabbing. The medical witnesses, he said, denied the possibility of such a thing. He drew attention to discrepancies between the prisoner's statements and those of other witnesses. It was absurd to suppose the prisoner's story true, as he could only saw one man fall, and that Ford, thus upsetting the prisoner's statement that he was on the ground with Ford on top when the knife was used. His lordship, in instructing the jury, took a very decisive stand favoring the crown case.
