MOB LYNCHES PRIEST

Lisbon, Aug. 28.—Dispatches received here today from the Portuguese town of Aldela Obispo tell of the putting to death of a priest by an infuriated mob.

The parish priest, it is alleged, attempted to conduct a funeral without the traditional burial rites, and the authorities and the people of the town objected. In the scuffle which ensued the priest, whose surname was torn, an elderly man, and was placed under arrest. On the pretext of changing his surplice before accompanying a constable, the priest went to the presbytery and secured a revolver, with which he shot the policeman dead.

The inhabitants, infuriated by this act, stormed the parsonage, and after seizing the priest, lynched him. Burial of the body, which was horribly mutilated, in the local cemetery was opposed by the angry crowd.

SARNIA SCHOONER WRECKED IN FIERCE GALE OFF THUNDER BAY

The Julia Larsen Is a Complete Loss, but Crew Was Saved by Heroic Work of Rescuers From Lighthouse—Driven on the Rocks and Smashed.

Sarnia, Aug. 27.—The little 50-ton schooner Julia Larsen of Sarnia was wrecked in a fierce gale off Thunder Bay Island last night. The captain and crew are all residents of Sarnia and were only saved by heroic work on the part of the life-saving corps on the island.

The Larsen was bound down from Spanish River with a cargo of lumber for dealers here. She became water-logged early in the day and was blown about at random, finally being tossed by the waves on the rocky ledge at the southeast end of Thunder Bay Island.

Was Missing Recently. The Larsen is the same vessel which was reported missing over a month ago, but turned up later safe and sound in Sarnia Bay.

Five lives were in danger for a time, but remarkable work on the part of Capt. Parsons and the Sarnia life-savers averted a tragedy.

The Larsen is a total loss, but it is believed that part of the rocky lumber can be saved. The boat is owned by M. Kindy, of Niagara Falls, Ont. When she struck the island she was already partly filled with water. A great hole was torn in her as she hit the rocks, and a veritable torrent of water poured in.

Children in Peril

Mrs. Thomas Swanson, wife of the captain, and her two children, were lying in their berth in the cabin at the time, while husband and brother struggled with the little craft on deck above. When the vessel struck, the children were torn from their mother's side by the force of rushing water, and were washed about the cabin for several minutes before she could again get her arms around them.

Life-savers experienced great difficulty in reaching the Larsen, the surf boat missing jagged points of rocks many times. The Swansons were taken to the life-saving station, and well kept there until recovered from the shock of their experience. The lighthouse tender Amaranthe and life-saving crew will make an effort to save the Larsen's cargo.

UNITED STATES MAY INTERVENE TO BRING PEACE TO MEXICO

Situation Is Becoming Intolerable, American Interests on the Border Suffering Greatly—Robbery and Pillage in All Sections of the South.

Washington, Aug. 28.—Reports from South Mexico, so alarming as to make the danger of American intervention in that country greater than ever before, have been received in Washington. So serious has the situation appeared to President Taft that in discussions with members of the cabinet and others recently he has expressed the gravest fears of necessity for far more drastic action on the part of the United States than has yet been taken in Mexico.

It is stated that while the operations of General Orozco and his men in Northern Mexico near the United States border are expediting, to a degree, and injurious to American interests, the most serious phase of the situation lies in the conditions existing in Southern Mexico. In the Southern States Zapata's forces have been operating continually for many months, and have so got the upper hand in the Southern States that the authority of the Federal Government has almost disappeared.

FOUND IN RIVER

Unidentified Woman Was Good-Looking and Well-Dressed.

Windsor, Aug. 27.—The body of an unidentified woman, about 35 years of age, was found on the Canadian side of the Detroit River today near Ojibwa, where it had been washed ashore. The body had been in the water about three weeks, according to Coroner J. S. Labelle, who was notified. The woman was dressed in a blue serge dress and wore brown buttoned shoes. She had brown hair and weighed about 130 pounds. The man's remains are being held at Sutton's morgue, here awaiting identification. The clothing is of fairly good material, and the woman was rather good-looking. There are no marks on the body.

MAYORS OF CANADA MEET AT WINDSOR

Twelfth Annual Convention of The Canadian Municipalities Union.

THE TAXATION PROBLEM

Delegates From the West Favor the Assessment of Land Values.

Windsor, Aug. 27.—Seventy-five of the one hundred delegates expected were present at the opening of the twelfth annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities at the city hall here this morning. The address of welcome was delivered by Mayor J. H. Shepherd, of Windsor and was seconded by President J. W. McCready, of Fredericton, for the union, and by Mayor Elliott, of Halifax, on behalf of the delegates.

It was shortly after 10 o'clock when President McCready took the chair, and called the convention to order in the council chamber. At that hour many of the delegates had not yet arrived, and the balance of the forenoon was given over to an impromptu reception and introductions in the mayor's office. This afternoon the formal address of the president, reports from the secretary and treasurer, and also extended reports from the affiliated provincial municipal unions of Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick took up the time of the delegates until four o'clock.

That hour adjournment was taken and the visitors were taken in autos to Walkerville, where an informal luncheon was tendered by Hiram Walker & Sons, followed by an inspection of the distillery. Tomorrow morning the real work will begin with the reading of technical papers on the various problems with which municipalities have to contend.

Assessment Revision. The question of revision in assessment laws was brought before the convention at an evening session by papers on municipal taxation by Ald. Joseph Clark, of Edmonton, and Ald. W. Hepburn, of Vancouver. In both cities the system of exempting land from taxation has been adopted. The papers and the discussion which followed indicated that the system of assessing land values is favored by representatives of western cities, while those of the older cities in Eastern Canada in many cases are opposed to it. The triumph of our land tax in Edmonton is shown by the fact that in 1906 we had building permits to the value of \$1,562,000, while in 1912, the first year we had taxes other than land taxes, we had taken off, they were \$15,500,000," said Ald. Clark.

The land tax in Vancouver is the principal cause of the growth of the city in recent years," said Ald. Hepburn. "The difficulty of making owners of buildings keep them in sanitary condition has been greatly lessened and the tax on land has also had the effect of causing owners of vacant property to improve it."

No one will attempt to dispute that the tax in Victoria has been most beneficial," said Mayor J. E. Beckwith, of the western city. The system of taxing buildings is simply a system of finding a man for improving his property."

DROWNED AT ERIEAU

Little Chatham Girl Was Carried Out by the Undertow.

MR. ROWELL TO DISCUSS THE COMPENSATION ACT

Big Meeting of Workmen To Be Held at Woodstock Thursday.

I shall esteem it a personal favor if you will meet me at the city hall on Thursday evening, Aug. 29, at 8 o'clock for such a conference. The object of such a meeting is to explain the present position of this important matter, and to secure a free and frank expression of opinion on the part of the men who will be most affected by the proposed legislation.

The body of the late commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army was removed to the Olympia, where a memorial service will be held this evening.

WET WEATHER OF WEST IS DELAYING HARVEST

Many Fields of Ripe Grain Near Edmonton Levelled By Downpour.

Regina, Aug. 27.—Heavy rain fell this morning and delayed the harvest for a day, but it is the first delay since cutting started. Cutting is half-done in this district, and reports received at Regina indicate that 25 per cent of the cutting in Southern Saskatchewan is completed. There is no frost damage.

Winnipeg, Aug. 27.—Heavy rains fell over this district for several hours today, and harvesting was delayed. The ground is very soft and the wheat crop of the end of the week. Much of the wheat crop of the Red River Valley, however, is already in stock. Temperatures are higher.

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 27.—The rainy weather of last night continues here today, and harvesting in the Edmonton district is practically at a standstill. The ground is very soft and the violent downpour of last night has levelled many of the fields of ripe grain. In Sturgeon, many acres of oats are flat and considerable wheat has been knocked down.

SENT FOR TRIAL

Three Charges Were Preferred Against Alleged Stratford Burglar.

WANT SUNDAY TRAINS LONDON TO ST. THOMAS

Petition To Be Presented Asking That Present Schedule Be Continued.

St. Thomas, Aug. 27.—It is likely that the citizens of St. Thomas will petition the Pere Marquette Railroad to continue running Sunday trains through the autumn and winter to London from St. Thomas.

Unless new arrangements are made these trains will be stopped after next Sunday, when the summer time table is changed, and there will be no rail-way communication whatever between St. Thomas and London, greatly inconveniencing those who wish to travel between these points, and especially travellers for Toronto, who usually have to leave St. Thomas at 3 a.m. on the Michigan Central and Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railways to reach their destination.

RUSH TO A. O. C.

Freshman's Class Will Be Best on Record at Opening.
