

Joe Bush Comes From Same Place as Bender

Once Expressed Wish He Could Pitch in World'. Series Against the Giants-Is Not Yet Twenty Years of Age.

New York, Oct. 10.-Possibly Connie Mack played a hunch in picking Leslie Bush, whose middle name, "Joe," usually is applied to him by his pals, to work the third game of the world's series. For Bush comes from the same town as Chief Bender, who on Tuesday succeeded in putting a game across, though hard hit, and not especially impressive in any way. Neither Bender nor Bush worked as well as Eddie Plank, but both have

won, while the left-hander went down to defeat.

Bush's home town in Brainerd, Minnesota, which, as said, also is the native place of the Athletics' Indian boxman. Until the spring of last year the youngster never had pitcher a game of ball in any league. He is less than 20 years old now, having been born in November, 1893, and until last season spent most of his summer days twirling for independent ball clubs near his home, after having made a reputation on the Brainerd High

Two years ago this month, when the Athletics were playing the Giants for the world championship, Bush was at his home. All Brainerd gathered around the telegraph office, at the railroad station, to hear the returns Bender pitched three games that year, winning two of the world's series. of them. He lost the first to Mathewson, 2 to 1. As the account of this gam was coming in. Bush said:

"I'd like to pitch in one of those series some time. And I'd like it to b gainst the Giants, to get back at them for beating the old chief."

Now his dream has come true, much more quickly than he would hav loped, had he thought it ever would be realized. In the spring of 1912 he went to Missoula, Montana, in the Union Association. Bush and Carl Zamfielding was a big factor in defeating loch, who was bought by Detroit and sold to Providence, pitched Missoula to a pennant. Mack bought Bush. He did not use him much at the start of the eason, but worked him pretty well towards the close,
