THRIVING BUSINESS DONE IN HORSEFLESH

Montreal, March 5.—The proprietor of one of the three equine abattoirs on the south shore stated tonight that at each between 50 and 60 horses are killed in a week, the animals being inspected before and after slaughter by a veterinarian.

The animals are old ones, and are bought for \$3 to \$5 each. The horseflesh is cut up, treated with a solution of salt and saltpeter and packed dry in barrels containing 500 pounds each. According to the informant it is then shipped to Sweden. He denied that any of it was sold in Montreal, so far as he knew. In Sweden there was great demand for it.

About 300 pounds of meat were obtained from each animal; the hides fetch \$5 to \$6, and the bones, fat, blood, hoofs, hair, shoes and intestines (for sausage casings) are all sold, bringing a profit of \$15 to \$20 on each animal. Each of the abattoir companies is capitalized at \$100,000.

FRIEDMANN CURE IS FUTILE

Montreal, March 5.—It is almost a year since Dr. F. H. Friedmann, of Berlin, and of ture serum fame, visited Montreal and treated a large number of tuberculous patients at the Royal Victoria Hospital. The physicians in charge of the cases now state that absolutely no benefit has resulted from the treatment. The few deaths that have occurred were probably neither hastened nor delayed.

Dr. Adami, professor of pathology at McGill University, who followed the treatment carefully, said today that Dr. Friedmann might eventually produce a cure by working along the same lines.

FARM HELP FOR MIDDLESEX IS EXPECTED VERY SHORTLY

Strathroy Man Will Go to Scotland and Ireland and Bring Back Many Young Men to Relieve the Situation Here.

The executive committee of the Greater Middlesex Association met at the department of agriculture office, King street, Thursday afternoon, and a great deal of important business was transacted relative to boosting the county.

Vice-President Laughton opened the meeting and stated that he felt proud that the county had at last decided to grapple with the emigration problem. Thomas Benstead, Strathroy, will leave Canada for Great Britain on March 11 and will remain there two months, during which time, he believes, a large number of farmhands will be secured for the farmers of Middlesex.

Mr. Laughton wishes all farmers requiring help to send in their names to Mr. Riggs, immigration agent, London, who will work in conjunction with Mr. Benstead. Secretary S. D. Dawson will also do valuable work at Quebec and Montreal in obtaining men and will make sure that the immigrants come on to Middlesex and

not get sidetracked as in the past. The vice-president believes the dawn of a new era is at hand for Middlesex.

A discussion took place as to what parts of the old country Mr. Benstead should direct his activities.

W. J. Bartlett thinks the representative should devote his time in the agricultural district over there. Scotland, he said, was a good country to obtain suitable farmhands, as also was Ireland.

Mr. Benstead promised to visit these places and stated that he looked for good results.

The consensus of opinion expressed was that single young men could be placed on farms immediately they arrived here, but a man with a family would be handicapped owing to the average farmer having no house accommodation for them.

Mr. Laughton believes this is a great drawback in building up the county and is a vital question that should be dealt with by the farmer himself.

PROPOSES TO CLOSE BARS ON HOLIDAYS

Bill Introduced in Legislature by Centre Bruce Member—More "Financing."

Toronto, March 5.—William McDonald (Centre Bruce) introduced two bills in the Legislature today, one to close bars on all public holidays and at noon on Saturdays, and another to give the legislative franchise to women.

T. W. McGarry (South Renfrew), occupied the best part of the opening hour making "comparisons" and drawing "impressions" from what Opposition speakers had said. He drew the ire of Mr. Rowell by saying that the Liberal leader had ignored his predecessor, Sir George Ross, when opening his campaign in Toronto in 1911, a statement which Mr. Rowell quickly refuted by quoting the opening paragraph of his speech. Mr. McGarry spent some time in drawing parallels between the percentage of revenue expended by Great Britain, Germany and New York City upon education, claiming that the province led, appropriating 19 per cent of its income for education.

Public Should Know. Sam Clarke (West Cumberland) who is a match for Mr. McGarry in repartee, declared for an "open door" in the public accounts committee. The committee was not serving its purpose if, when the Opposition was aspersing "interesting facts about public expenses, the door should be slammed shut." (Applause.)

Garry that Mr. Rowell was posing as a "saint," and would like to see the public and private records of both men side by side. "You look like a saint, don't you?" he shouted across the floor with telling sarcasm.

J. W. Johnston (West Hastings) proceeded by a circumlocutory process to show how a large revenue could be secured by taxing the capital of banks "on the basis of 16 per cent." This fund could be divided among the provinces in the ratio that the deposits of the province bore to the total capital of the banks.

Eventual Sought Advances. It is learned today that Mr. Evan-turel, before making his now famous expose in the House, tried to get an advance payment of indemnity. About a month ago he actually secured \$100 and only a few days ago (after the Ferguson disclosure) applied for \$200 more.

This was denied him by the Legislative Assembly's accountant. Evan-turel applied to the provincial treasurer and to the attorney-general, but they were unyielding until the matter was disposed of by the House. The sessional indemnity is \$1,400. A member is allowed six days' absence, and for any absence beyond that he is deducted \$15 per day. On the other hand, a member may draw \$20 per day for each day's attendance. This is based on the assumption that the session will last 30 days. Evan-turel's explanation is hourly expected by the Government, and the question is being canvassed whether he is delaying the fatal moment to increase whatever indemnity he is permitted to draw.

MRS. WM. PATTERSON WAS FATALLY INJURED

Slipped on Ice While Out in Her Backyard—Pioneer of North Oxford.

Ingersoll, March 5.—Mrs. William Patterson, aged 70, died at her home tonight from concussion of the brain caused by her slipping on an icy spot while out in her yard in the morning.

She never recovered consciousness. With her husband she moved to Ingersoll from North Oxford four years ago. She had resided in the district all her life and was very widely known and esteemed.

Besides her husband, three sons survived, Walter, in Ingersoll; Glen, on the old homestead on the Government Road in Oxford, and Archie, in Vancouver.

FOURTEEN DISTILLERIES NOW OPERATING IN CANADA

Dominion Has 261 Cigar and Tobacco Factories and 64 Breweries.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, March 5.—According to information given in the House today, fourteen distilleries are in operation in Canada. Ontario has nine, Quebec four and British Columbia one.

There are 64 breweries, 28 malt houses and 261 tobacco and cigar factories.

Today Sir Wilfrid Laurier questioned the conductor, Pierre Blandin, deputy speaker of the House, in going into the contest in Chateaugay. Sir Wilfrid, by resolution based on British practice, declared that "in the opinion of this House, in the discharge of the duties and responsibilities of the deputy speaker towards this House, he is bound by and subject to the same rules as apply to Mr. Speaker, and that therefore he is debarred from taking part in electoral contests."

When Premier Borden concurred with this view Sir Wilfrid withdrew his motion, saying he thought the present discussion might serve the purpose he sought.

TRUE BILLS ARE FOUND

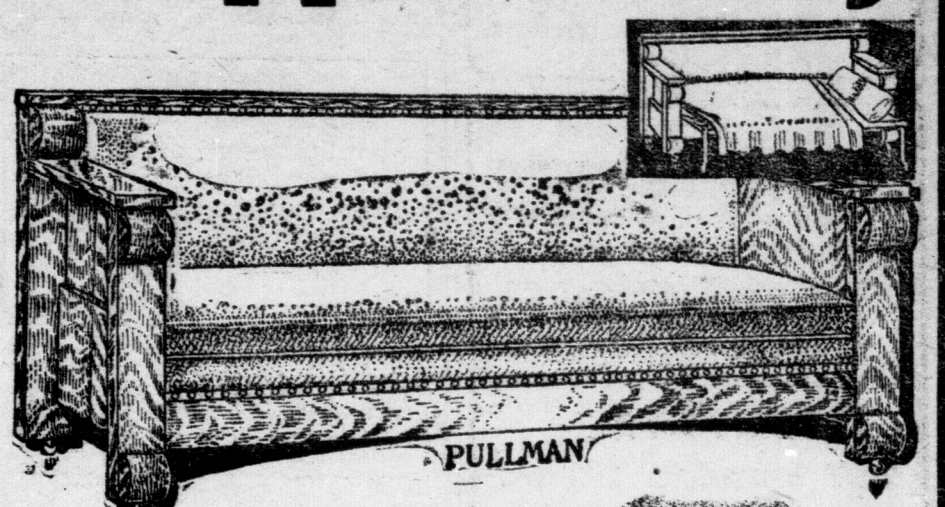

NIAGARA PEACHES ARE ONLY ONES INJURED

Lambton and Essex Are Looking For a Record Production.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Niagara Falls, March 5.—Notwithstanding that a considerable number of peach buds were nipped during the recent cold dip growers all through the district are looking for a very fair crop this year.

The Elberta peaches seem to have escaped practically unhurt, but the St. John and Crawford varieties in some districts will not be more than half a crop. All the growers however are most optimistic, especially as the berry crops have escaped unhurt and they expect to make most satisfactory returns.

Pruning in hundreds of orchards, is still in progress, and will be for some weeks to come.

LITTLE HARM IN ESSEX.

Fruit men are complaining more of the "girdling" of young trees by wild rabbits more than anything else. Scores of trees have been hurt in this way.
