COLONEL HUGHES
Continued From Page One.

Col. Hughes declared, but what kept him from sleeping nights was the fact that the press had been so full of platitudes on peace he feared that anyone who sought to keep up the militia was looked upon as a bloodthirsty person. While the talk had been all of peace the world had in the past fourteen years seen some of its most ruthless wars, and of these he called the roll from South Africa to Mexico.

"Don't forget Ulster," remarked Mr. Lemieux.
"If you would know how Ulster would fight, look at what Stonewall Jackson's corps did in Shenandoah Valley," said Col. Hughes.
Strikes Are Civil Wars.
"When the Mexican troubles broke, the peace organization of the United States forgot its principles, and wired President Wilson that the league was not for peace at any price. So long as men were what they are today there was constant danger of war. A hundred and thirteen thousand criminal convictions last year and the importation of thirty-three million dollars' worth of whiskey and tobacco gave a fair indication of our moral standard. Strikes were incipient civil wars, and Canada had seen many recently. In Canada, as elsewhere, the essential of peace was readiness for war. A picture of Canada, invaded was drawn by Col. Hughes. "It is the country that has invaded and overrun that suffers," he declared.

Benefits of War.
War was not without beneficial results, for after each war there had been a period of splendid intellectual development. In war time, self-indulgence, which in peace masqueraded as religion gave way to self-sacrifice. Col. Hughes eulogized Col. Roosevelt and his declaration that the finest South American republics were those which kept their military forces up to a high standard. "If Canada were invaded, the soldiers and whippers would lose more in a month than it cost to run the whole militia department. Stock gambling and commercial enterprises were the cause of wars, and though the soldier was never in favor of war, he was the first to face the music. He had heard with approval, Sir Wilfrid Laurier say, when Canadian soldiers were invading the Panama trophy victory, that every man should have a horse, saddle and rifle.

Not He!
"Everyone stands off and dare not touch Quebec with a pair of tongs. Not me. I carry my work right into Quebec. Here am I, a fire-eating Orangeman, proud to inspect 4,000 Catholic cadets under the charge of 1,600 priests at Montreal," remarked the colonel.
He said that last year the department was giving military training to 12,000 school teachers, and since he took office 17,000 officers and teachers had taken out certificates as military instructors. All over the country farming communities were clamoring for drill halls to encourage the training of boys. If he could get the money, he would erect them right away. Only \$4,000,000 had been spent on drill halls since confederation, and of these 50, costing \$2,360,000, had been erected since the Borden Government took office. "Military drill keeps the boys and girls from getting around these nickle shows," he affirmed. "My aim is first the development of fine young manhood and womanhood and second defence."

What Could Have Been.
Charges of reckless extravagance in the erection of drill halls were baseless. Each mile of the National Transcontinental Railway would have constructed ten drill halls and the total cost of the railway would have built a drill hall 170 yards broad clear across the continent, and the amount spent on the Newmarket canal would have erected a drill hall, and the useless dredging, wharves and breakwaters during the past twenty years would have constructed 1,500, and if only want 50 this year. "The seaward wharf cost \$200,000, and the expenses of the late lamented technical education commission would have built ten. How many would the last year's trip to Europe represent?" asked Mr. Lemieux. "Two" was the reply, "and the automobiles one."

rise ranges which Canada would need for the next hundred years. "How many would the Bonnie Belair deal build?" asked Mr. Kite. Col. Hughes assured the House that Canada had real need for only about 1,500 men. At present there were but 7,427 men in the militia, however, there were 44,680 cadets being trained, 23,880 members of civilian rifle clubs, 500,000 on the militia reserve and 18,000 men organized into corps and sections to be equipped. He estimated the total at 724,197, which with the instructors trained since 1911, made a grand total of 736,157.

In the fiscal year just closed the cost of the militia had been but five and two-thirds per cent of the revenue of Canada; that the year before he had spent but 1.5 per cent on militia. He pointed out that while in the last Liberal year more than eight millions had been spent, compared with the militia expenditures of Germany, Britain, the United States and Australia the Canadian defense bill was a modest thing.
The First Row.
The first row came after dinner. Mr. Macleod, of Sherbrooke, said that the quarters of the militia of that town which was also the meeting place of St. George's Society, was not run upon lines calculated to encourage straight shooting.

"The member has blackguarded St. George's Society behind his back," shouted Col. Hughes.
There was a roar of protest from the Liberal side, and the speaker demanded the withdrawal of the unparliamentary language.

"To say that an honorable member blackguards someone is pretty strong language," Chairman Eldon said. "Withdraw, withdraw," shouted Liberal members. Col. Hughes shook his head.

Chairman Eldon said the minister affirmed he had not used the word blackguard regarding any member.
"The minister cannot get up and say he did not say what every member present just heard him say," declared Mr. Knowles. "The expression must be withdrawn, and it is your duty, Mr. Chairman, to compel him to withdraw."

Even a Manly Man.
Mr. Campbell said that if the minister were even a manly man, let alone an honorable soldier, he would withdraw an offensive and insulting expression. Col. Hughes attempted to proceed with his remarks. Dr. Michael Clark rose and pressed for the chairman's ruling, stating that the minister had used the expression, had been very near being disorderly.

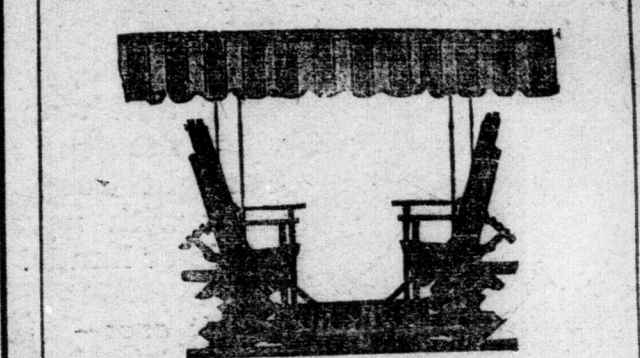
