Washington, Dec. 18.—The interstate commerce commission today granted the application of the eastern railroads for a five per cent advance in freight rates, excepting on certain specified commodities. Commissioners Harlan and Clements dissented.

The carriers are permitted to make the applied-for advances in rates except the rail-lake-and-rail, lake-and-railand-rail-and-lake traffic; rates on bitu-minous coal and coke; rails on anthracite coal and iron ore, and rates that are held by unexpired orders of the com-After further consideration, the commission permits advances to be made also on cement, starch, brick, tile, clay

and plaster. On these commodities no advances were permitted by the decision of August 1.

Joint rates between official classification territory and territory south of the Potomac and Ohio and east of the Mississippi may be increased not to exceed 5 per cent.




