Would Immediately Cease Exports of Logs and Pulp.

LONDON, Dec. 1 .- Under the title 'A Pacifist Dream of the Food Embargo," the Spectator argues that an American embargo would have serious consequences. It would be opposed by the American farmers and livestock traders, says the newspaper, because it would depress prices, and also the business people would be reasonably frightened by the thought of retaliatory

embargoes.


