### FREIGHT CAR SHORTAGE OF NATIONAL IMPORT

Dominion Railway Commission to Hear  
Appeal for Higher Demurrage Rate.

MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—The prevailing car shortage has become a problem of national importance, according to railway officials, and the Dominion Railway Commission will open an inquiry into the question in Toronto, on December 11. The Canadian Pacific Railway, Grand Trunk Railway, Michigan Central Railway, and Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway Companies, acting as well on behalf of other railway companies in Canada, have applied to the board for an order increasing the demurrage charge from \$1 to \$4 per car each day a car is held after the expiration of the free time allowed.

Some idea of the number of cars being withheld from active use by shippers is given by a Grand Trunk Railway official, who states that the Canadian railways are at present receiving about \$30,000 a month in demurrage charges, representing 90,000 cars each month held up one day over the limit, or 15,000 cars held two days. The railways do not want the demurrage; they want the cars to carry on their business and serve their customers.

## ENEMIES' CONDUCT PRECLUDES CHANGE OF GIVING FAVORS

Request of States, However,  
May Get Austrian Through.

### THIS IS LORD CECIL'S VIEW

London Believes Washington's  
Appeal May Be Accepted To.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The strong impression prevails here that Great Britain has acceded to the second request made by Washington for a safe conduct for Count Adam Tarnowski von Tarnow, recently-appointed Austro-Hungarian ambassador to the United States.

Although stating that he had not yet seen the Washington request, Lord Cecil, minister of war trade, in discussing the question with the Associated Press correspondent, said:

"It must be kept in mind that the question presents two entirely distinct phases. The first is that of belligerents to whom we could not extend favor under the circumstances. We can discuss and arrange for the exchange of military and civilian prisoners, and other similar matters with the central powers, but on account of their actions in this war, we cannot be expected to grant them a similar favor."

The other phase, "The other phase concerns a friendly neutral, like the United States, to whom we are ready to grant any favor which does not violate our imperative necessities."

"To grant safe conduct to Count Tarnowski, for which there are precedents, may fall within the latter phase, but it is a difficult question, about which it would be dangerous to prophesy." The American request has been presented directly to Viscount Grey, secretary for foreign affairs. A little time may elapse before a reply is received, as he will have to consult the French Government.

### STATES PROMISED TOO SOON.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—A telegram received in Amsterdam from Vienna, as forwarded by Reuters' correspondent, says the Austro-Hungarian Government did not make the appointment of Count Adam Tarnowski von Tarnow as ambassador to the United States until after assurance had been received from the United States that a safe conduct for the ambassador would be forthcoming.

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## CANADA BIG FACTOR IN PREVENTING ANY AMERICAN EMBARGO

Would Immediately Cease Ex-  
ports of Logs and Pulp.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Under the title "A Pacific Dream of the Food Embargo," the Spectator argues that an American embargo would have serious consequences. It would be opposed by the American farmers and livestock traders, says the newspaper, because it would depress prices, and also the business people would be reasonably frightened by the thought of retaliatory embargoes.

"Suppose, and it is no mere empty supposition," says the Spectator, "that the Parliament at Ottawa declared if America put an embargo on exports of food to the Allied countries, they would put one on her logs and pulp. Where would the newspaper of the United States get sufficient paper to meet their demands?"

The New Statesman says: "Those who have a finger on the financial pulse have lately been feeling increasingly uneasy about the nation's expenditure. We are going to continue the spending of £1,000,000,000 a year, when at most we have £3,000,000,000 to do it with. That is why the chancellor of the exchequer has not only been driven to borrow from the United States on extremely generous terms nearly all of our marketable foreign investments in order to pawn them at New York, but is also compelled to borrow from hand-to-mouth from bankers there in order to keep exchange from going to a dangerously adverse figure."

The newspaper adds that the deficit can be made up from the accumulated wealth only to a limited extent, because it is not in the form in which it can pass immediately into circulation, and, much more, cannot be sold to neutral, even the prosperous United States, because there is a near limit to the amount that can be spared. It is argued that the aggregate public and private expenditure must be limited to a sum increasingly near the annual production, and that £500,000,000 retrenchment can be effected by the better-paid workers and those with incomes above the income tax minimum.
