New York, Nov. 28.—The reactionary movement of stock prices, which had been under way for three consecutive weeks, was halted this week when it pecame apparent that most of the weeks, was halted this week when it became apparent that most of the weakened marginal accounts had been oversold by overzealous bear traders. Railroad shares began to play a more important part in the market on the publication of unusually favorable October earnings statements by the principal railways of the continent and reports of progress on pending mergers. Steels made impressive recovery on reports that unfilled orders were steadily increasing in the face of expanding mill operations. Plants of the United States Steel Corporation were said to be working at 83 per cent of capacity, as against 81 per cent a fortnight ago.

Oils displayed a firm undertone. The trade situation showed marked improvement as reflected in decreasing crude production stiffening gasoline and crude prices and the raising of the Phillips Petroleum dividend.

Tobaccos began to reflect the increased holiday business, practically all issues in that group breaking through to new high levels for the year. Mercantile, mail order and chain-store issues moved up in response to reports of increased earnings. Motors appear to have corrected the top-heavy specuvolent advances indulged in a few weeks ago, recoveries being made by lative condition resulting from the many issues in that group.
