

# Stengel's Veteran Bat, For Second Time, Beats Yankees in Owl Field

## "CASEY THE IMMORTAL" LASHES BALL TO RIGHT FIELD BLEACHERS FOR ONLY SCORE OF HEROIC DUEL

Artie Nehf Pitches Masterly Ball For Giants, But Sad Sam Jones, Hurling For the Yankees, Pitched a Tighter Game, Allowing But Four Hits to Nehf's Six—Mighty Casey's Drive in the Seventh Clinched Game For Giants—Ruth Makes First Hit of Game.

### BUT ONE ERROR IN THE ENTIRE BATTLE

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Casey Stengel, it would seem, in heroic mold, Casey Stengel, Casey the immortal, smashed the New York Giants to victory with a home-run drive this afternoon for the second time in three days of record-breaking world's series strife with the Yankees.

Lashed into the right field bleachers of the Yankee Stadium in the seventh inning, Stengel's blow broke up a tense, thrilling duel between Artie Nehf, southpaw star of the Giants, and "Sad Sam" Jones, of the Yanks, and gave the world's champions their solitary, but sufficient, margin in a brilliant 1 to 0 triumph.

The greatest throng that ever paid its way into a baseball arena—65,000 frenzied fans, who were massed in the gigantic inclosure—will 30,000 more swarmed about the entrances outside, saw Stengel deliver the blow that gave John McGraw and his warriors a two to one game in the most stirring baseball drama of all time.

All world's series records for attendance and gate receipts were shattered by that vast gathering in baseball's greatest amphitheater. The actual paid attendance was \$2,450, besides 30,000 more who did not go through the turnstiles, while the total receipts were \$207,072, putting the three-game figures beyond \$500,000, and practically assured for 1923 the first million-dollar championship in history.

The paid attendance broke the former record of 60,231 established during a double-header at the Stadium late in the regular season, while the gathering as a whole has but one superior in size, that of approximately 70,000 that witnessed the dedication of the big structure last spring.

Into Glory's Hall Again. For a day Stengel had stepped out of the limelight while Babe Ruth rose to the pinnacle of fame with two circuit-clinching home runs in the second game of the third successive tie struggle between these Gotham rivals. But today "Old Casey," bow-legged, but lion-hearted, knew again the call to glory that was his when his ninth-inning home run gave the Giants their first triumph—and again he answered its summons.

Perhaps the setting sun was as dramatic as in the first game, but that mattered not to Casey, for the result was just as effective, and gave to the veteran a record that has no equal in the world's series and his feat of winning two games with home runs in a single championship, its nearest approach is the work of "Home Run" Baker, who won two games for the old Athletics with circuit-clinching home runs in separate series in 1913.

And so, stripping to its essentials the classic of 1923, in which the Yankees won three games and the Giants two, the score stands: Stengel, two victories; Jones, one.

Pipp Out Again. It was a heart-breaking setback for Jones, melancholy mountaineer of the Yankees, who pitched even more brilliantly than did his southpaw rival, Nehf, in triumph. And so it was doubly disastrous for the Yankee machine, for with defeat they lost also, at least temporarily, the services of their first baseman, Wally Pipp, who weakened again his wrenched ankle in sliding in the second in the seventh inning and was forced to leave the game.

Just how serious the injury could not be determined tonight, but the general belief prevailed that it might not be the Yankees' last. He was swathed in bandages, Pipp was able to hobble about after the game. He declared he would be ready to pitch back into the lineup tomorrow, but Miller Huggins, mite manager of the club, shook his head hesitatingly.

"I can't tell until tomorrow whether he will be able to pitch back into the game or not," declared Huggins. "His ankle is swollen and giving him much pain, of course, but it may be possible to work it around into condition tomorrow. In the event he is unable to go in, I will switch Ruth to first base where he finished today's game, and probably use Harvey Hendrick, who is a right-handed pitcher, in place of Pipp."

Stengel, Sam's Jinx. For eight innings Jones, hero of a first performance this season, baffled the Giants, save Stengel, with a marvelous change of pace and superb control, yielding but four scattered hits, while Nehf was being found for six. Except for Stengel, but one Giant got as far as second base, but that mighty wallop of Casey's wrecked the Yankee twirler's masterpiece just when it seemed close to completion. Coming back in the eighth inning after that crushing blow, Jones pitched a masterpiece, but he was withdrawn in favor of a pinch hitter in the Yankee half of that inning, when Huggins directed his last desperate but futile attack.

Joe Bush, victim of Stengel's homer in the first game, held the Giants hitless in the ninth.

Facing the first real crisis of the series, John McGraw played his ace, Nehf, and the nervous little southpaw came through with flying colors. His work was but slightly less effective than that of Jones. Three times he faced serious threats by the Yankees, and on each occasion he rose to the emergency and turned back his foe. In the fifth, he did the Yankees gather more than one hit off Nehf. He issued three passes, two of them fearfully to beat Ruth, and each time the strategy, unpopular though it was to the crowd that wanted to see the Babe "just smother," was vindicated.

Master Mind Won. For today the elementary encounter between "brute force" and "brain power" typified by Babe Ruth and Manager McGraw was in the background. It was McGraw's turn to apply the

kept him out of the game for ten days prior to the series. After a delay in which his ankle was bandaged, and he limped from the field, Schang sent Ward to second with a sharp single to left. Scott caught one of Nehf's curves for a wicked smash down the third base line. Groh, diving, somehow clutched the ball and then lunged forward. Stengel's home-run drive in the seventh, which was followed by a double-play again nipped the rally. Jones hitting to Frisch, who completed the two-kill by a game of Bancroft and Kelly.

Too Much Nehf. Except for these few spurts the Yankees were helpless before Nehf's sweeping curves. Four were retired on strikes, Jones and Witt failing in succession in the third, Ruth letting a third strike out in sharply on him in the sixth, while Pipp was whiffed in the ninth.

The story of the Giant attack is the story of the Yankees' home-run drive. Jones was hit by a double in the first six innings, but five got to first at last. Jones, who was hit by a double in the sixth, but the rally was short-lived. No one was prepared for Stengel's home-run drive in the seventh, except Casey himself. Fans seemed to have forgotten his feat of two days before when he hit Jones and he was just another Giant to mow down.

But Jones took one chance too many, and when he got an incurve down Stengel's groove there was a crack, a roar, and Casey, in his uncontrollable excitement, leaped to his feet and ran to the bases with the run that won the game. Ward, who was hit by a double in the seventh, threw arm and ball in his first great victory, he had a triumphal procession today.

In the fourth, Meusel drove into a double play, eliminating Ruth and himself, while advancing Dugan to third, but Pipp was an easy victim for Frisch and Kelly for the third out. Again in the eighth, with two out, and Dugan at first by virtue of the forceout of Whitey Witt, Ruth was walked, and again, with two men on base, Meusel failed. The time he flitted out to Stengel to end the inning.

Heinie Groh Starred. The inning before, the seventh, saw the most dangerous rally of the Yankees, which was checked by a sparkling play by Heinie Groh, the most brilliant bit of defensive work of the game. With two out, and Dugan at first, but on Ward's shot to Bancroft, the first sacker was forced at second, the play in which he twisted the ankle which had
